




If you missed it, well I will be excellent this year, just wait ... and Linda, ooh, la,la!!



compatibility issues. When I clicked on the app a cutesy notice said "oh no, we've



We all enjoyed the article so much and so did Brian Weigand from WLNI Radio. I spoke with him on the phone and gave him contact information for Sadie and her mom so he could get in touch with them about interviewing Sadie the third week in February on his radio show in conjunction with a series he was kicking off about *The Future*. Sadie was a little hesitant at first but did a WONDERFUL interview that also included her mom, Nicole.

Word of mouth is a powerful thing. When I had my January dental appointment the dental hygienist had seen the newspaper article and asked if Sadie was, "One of your Space Camp kids?" I called Nicole Tate and told her about the amazing gift Leigh had for Sadie and the phenomenal opportunity for Sadie to actually speak to a REAL ASTRONAUT. She was speechless and overwhelmed and told me that Sadie's wildest dream was about to become reality.

As of this writing I haven't heard from Sadie's mom about Sadie's SPECIAL evening *in the company of an astronaut* but she promised to let me know everything. She also said she would instruct Sadie to be the Heimdal's ambassador to Mr. Melvin.

flying by! I Cannot believe that we are already into March! Before you know it, we will be decorating for Halloween! For this month's newsletter I wanted to show one of my favorite projects, a Retro spaceship. I was commissioned by the Orthodontist from South Carolina for his Retro space theme. He had requested just a spaceship on an alien planet's surface but I wanted to take it to another level and have it in midflight blasting off! The main body of ship itself was assembled from model rocket ship parts but I then added the 4 vanes with the small cylinders on them and then added the porthole windows. The alien planet was created from foam. I wanted to give it an otherworldly look so I added purple and copper coloring. The ship is mounted to metal pole that goes into the center of the ship.

The fun part to this was the fire and smoke! I had seen other artists build this before but with small model ships so my challenge was to recreate it but on a much larger scale! I was able to create the fire and smoke using lights to begin with. I placed them on the metal pole holding the ship up. After that using bags of polyester cotton that was used to stuff pillows, I start to construct the shape of the column of fire along with the smoke. I lightly spray painted the pillow stuffing to give it the orange and yellow color, blending it out until the bottom where it then is just left white. It is actually quite convincing as fire and looks even better in person!

This is an effect that I hope to be able to use again in the future. I think making this effect with a large dragon head would be amazing to simulate the fire coming from its mouth but that will need to be a project for another day.

This particular piece was a huge hit for the Orthodontist office and was left up for about 6 months. I am already busy building another project for the Orthodontist. Next month I will be unveiling that in Aprils newsletter!

NASA AND SPACEX TARGET NEW CREW-6 LAUNCH DATE AFTER SCRUBBED EFFORT By Adm. Willy Smith, Chief Science Officer, Starfleet SFDPP Certified

Can you imagine locked in and ready to blast off from Earth only for something to go wrong at the last moment and then you have to sit there while all the fuel is drained away from the rocket so you can shift gears and remain in full gravity for several more days until they figure what the problem is? they will be conducting ... I can't wait for the results.



After NASA and SpaceX scrubbed the launch of Crew-6 just a couple of minutes before lift-off early on Monday morning, officials have announced they're now targeting Thursday for the next launch effort.

The team called off Monday's launch attempt at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida when it suddenly encountered an issue in the ground systems affecting the loading of the ignition fluids for the Falcon 9 rocket that will carry the astronauts to the International Space Station (ISS) inside the Crew Dragon Endeavour capsule. The launch team could not be sure there was a full load. A SpaceX engineer likened this critical

system to spark plugs for a car.

They're now aiming to launch the crew at 12:34 a.m. ET on Thursday, March 2 (9:34 p.m. on Wednesday, March 1). I might be able to make this (ws)!

Traveling aboard the Crew Dragon as part of Crew-6 will be NASA astronauts Stephen Bowen and Warren Hoburg,



United Arab Emirates astronaut Sultan Al Neyadi, and Roscosmos cosmonaut Andrey Fedyaev.

Following in the footsteps of numerous international astronauts who've traveled to the ISS over the last two decades, they'll spend about six months aboard the orbital outpost, living and working in microgravity conditions.

Much of their time will be spent performing <u>carefully designed</u> <u>science experiments</u>, among them <u>a fascinating effort</u> that will involve gathering samples of bacteria and fungi from surfaces on the outside of the space station.

The experiment will investigate whether any microbes exist around parts of the station such as its life support system vents, and try to determine how easily they can survive and whether they can spread. This should help planners of future crewed missions into deep space better understand the potential dangers of the human contamination of environments.

The crew will also perform spacewalks for the upgrade and maintenance of the station.

Supposing the Crew-6 mission gets underway early on Thursday morning ET, the beginning of it will be live streamed by NASA on its YouTube channel. The docking procedure and welcome ceremony at the space station will also be broadcast when it takes place about 24 hours later.



MEDICAL MINUTE - MARCH 2023 By Commodore Tammy White, Chief Medical Officer

This month I thought I would do a Medical Minute on the top 3 medical breakthroughs in healthcare. I found them interesting and I hope you do too. I obtained the information from the World Economic Forum on the internet.

The top 3 breakthroughs are:

1. Regrowing damaged body parts. I used to watch the Six Million Dollar Man so I liked they mentioned the show in the article. The Six Million Dollar Man, in case you didn't know, was a show about an astronaut that was injured on a test flight. He was given bionic legs, one arm, and an eye. I doubt anyone ever thought it would really be possible one day. It still remains science fiction, but technological advances in medicine are having amazing results. We are getting closer to our Trek world every day. When your knees get



creaky with age, the worn-out cartilage- the connective tissue that helps joints move smoothly-does not regenerate there are only two options: painkillers or an operation to replace the joint. In the future, stem-cell technology might be able to help cartilage and other parts of the body to regrow. That could help vast numbers of people: severe osteoarthritis is expected to affect well over 25% of the adult population by 2030. Regenerative medicine has much wider application, making it a game-changing area of medicine with the potential to fully heal damaged tissues and organs. The technology could help repair hearts damaged by heart attack and could mean body tissues or organs for transplant can be grown in laboratories.

- 2. A pill that lets you know you've taken it. You read that right. Patients on regular medication can find it difficult to remember if they have taken the right dose at the right time. A new pill has been created that contains a tiny sensor that records when it's take-information transmitted to a patch worn by the patient and then sent on to a smartphone. Patients and doctors can ensure the medication is being taken as needed, and innovation already being used in the treatment of schizophrenia and the other mental illnesses. That's just one idea making up the internet of medical things. Using networks of connected devices to sense vital data in real time. Their applications include telemedicine-where health care can be provided at a distance via phones and IT. Patients can use devices to measure blood pressure, monitor glucose levels and test for conditions from
 - blood samples-and send the results in real time to their doctors.
- 3. AI can detect skin cancer better than a doctor.

Melanoma skin cancers are not easily identifiable by sight and highly trained clinicians may sometimes get it wrong. A computer trained using images of skin cancer and the corresponding diagnosis achieved a 95% detection rate, well above the 87% success rate of human doctors. This is according to research published in the Annals of Oncology. Between 2-3 million non-melanoma skin cancers and 132,000 melanoma skin cancers occur



globally each year, according to the WHO. One in every 3 cancers diagnosed is a skin cancer and, according to Skin Cancer Foundation Statistics, one in every five Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime, the WHO says. Through its ability to sift through large amounts of information...AI can help health professionals with complex decision-making, and point out clinical nuances that they might have missed.

Engineering genetics to make the body kill cancer, growing artificial organs for transplant, and pills that can talk to you: these are all examples of how the fourth industrial revolution will radically change medical treatments by blurring the lines between the physical, digital, and biological. The fourth industrial revolution is transforming health and medicine



- 4. Regional Annual Awards nominations have been sent to the judges.



Long story short. Ha. When Kermit the Frog got back from the dimension of Amphibia, and then back from the big city



of the *Big City Greens* during the panel he was hosting at D23, he was on hand to hear Lawrence Fishburne announce that he was producing, along with Disney *Moon Girl and Devil Dinosaur*. A Marvel Comic property, it would be reimagined from its comic roots to feature Lunella Lafayette, a 13-year-old black heroine with Shuri and Stark level genius. And believe it or not, there are Star Trek connections here!

I am a part of many fandoms. The Stars, Trek and Wars, Muppets, Marvel, and animation in general. And I am a fan of any children's show that does not talk down to their viewers, depicts children standing up for their beliefs, and allows children to see that they have the power and skills to craft the solution to their problems.

In 2019 when this new Marvel animated TV show was announced, I was thrilled. I followed its development. The animation looked unique and vibrant. The characters were relatable and grounded in a Lower East Side (LES) that was recognizable. And the voice cast looked great. The show debuted in February on Disney Cable and Streaming Services. And it lived up to its hype.

Lunella, her parents, grandparents and best friend navigate life and challenges in their LES neighborhood, dealing with rolling brown outs, school, and supervillains all while having fun. The show is characterized as a S.T.E.M show. (Although, it could be seen as a S.T.E.A.M show since the artwork featured is wonderful.) But it is science, math and tech that are central to the plot and the main character's personality. It shows self-reliant kids using their brains to face life's obstacles.

While some programing geared to younger children vilifies social media, here it is portrayed as not some vile evil thing that kids get addicted to but something that those Lunella's age must learn to navigate with poise and grace while at the same time communicating feelings with emojis and encouraging us to punch that subscribe button. When she is told not to mind what the internet trolls say, it's from her savvy friend Casey who has seen it all before. No real finger-wagging in sight here which can turn off the intended viewers. In fact, in the first three episodes it seems as if no lesson is taught by her parents – it is extended family and friends that guide her when she needs it.

The plot thickens when Lunella, a genius, builds on the research of her role model, Moon Girl, and develops a portal through which emerges a T. Rex. This is an opportune time for a new street level super team to take the stage as it is learned that the power failures are caused by a supervillain. Lunella takes the name of her hero and dubs her sidekick Devil Dinosaur.

Moon Girl and Double D have been through a lot in even the first three episodes – facing the aforementioned actual troll (moral - one needs to learn how to keep trolls from feeding off of negative energy) and learning to be less competitive while making friends with a supercomputer (even though that supercomputer momentarily turned evil and hit our girl in the femur with a floor buffer). Hey some of the best friendships start out rocky – at least in the media. Fighting her new science teacher who also turned out to be an electricity sapping supervillain. School boards please stop letting experienced teachers walk away and leave openings that will inevitably be filled by supervillains. I'll say no more beyond this...spoilers.

Now trust me...there are Star Trek Connections here. Devil Dinosaur is voiced by Fred Tatasciore, the one and only Lt. Shaxs - Chief Security Officer and Ejector of Warp Cores on the USS Cerritos. He can convey his character's entire emotional range through a series of roars so varied that you can truly see that the relationship between Lunella and Devil goes beyond owner and pet. Despite being big and red, Clifford the Big Red Dog he ain't. And Lunella's grandmother, Mimi, who runs a family-owned roller-skating rink with her husband, is voiced by the one and only Alfre Woodard or Lily Sloan or the person who was supposed to be in the Phoenix with Zephram Cochran. There will be time for all my First Contact thoughts next month.

Through it all Moon Girl shows us that any girl - any person - can change the world. With brains, heart, friends and family any one of us can better our communities and jam out doing it. Check it out.
