

She also was very helpful in filling in for Virginia sending Thank You and Sympathy cards to Heimdal members when the need arose.

Through this contact both Willy and I got to know and appreciate Mariea and the joy she found in being a Heimdal member. 
Commodore Tammy White reported that the local hospital is no longer requiring that masks be always worn.

Captain Darrell Millner reported that the inter-departmental role play writing group is very active. Captain Millner also announced the next Engineering ZOOM meeting date and briefly discussed Region One activities.

Admiral Linda Smith then introduced the speaker for the evening, Ron Miller, who joined by way of ZOOM. Ron stated that in the past, he had mostly created digital art. More recently he has moved to more traditional painting methods. He then presented a slideshow of many of his paintings, most of which were landscape scenes on various moons and planets. Ron stated that he feels a special attachment to Pluto, because one of his paintings of that planet was made into a United States postal stamp. Further, one of those stamps with Ron's painting on it, is on the New Horizons probe currently traveling through the Solar System.

Ron spoke of his love of Jules Verne stories, some of which have inspired his artwork. He especially enjoys painting 1950's retro style rockets. Another reoccurring theme in his art is "Captain Judica," which is a character that his wife







created and for whom she is the model.

Ron stated that this latest book has just been released and is entitled, "The Big Back Yard, the Solar System beyond Pluto." Ron has also written and drawn a comic book series, entitled "Velda: Girl Detective." He has written 71 books overall.

The March 2023 meeting of the USS Heimdal was held in person and on ZOOM Saturday evening the 18th. Chief Engineer Darrell Millner transported to Madison Heights to join us!

Our guest this evening would be Heimdal friend and space artist extraordinaire Ron Miller. We love when Ron visits to share his artwork with us.

The evening started with some chatting and goofing around before Admiral Smith's always "brief" business meeting. Some of the things she reminded us of are:

- The April meeting will be the Anniversary party where you dress as your favorite episode! Get those costumes ready folks. Be sure to check out the Facebook page with daily and funny updates.
- The May meeting will be the public Star Trek auction where all crewmembers should wear their uniforms or any science fiction costume to add to the atmosphere. Some positions still need to be filled so email Linda if you are available to help.

It was now time for Ron's presentation. He gathered together some of his work to share in a slide show. He notes that the last few years he has been doing digital artwork but for this evening he wanted to share traditional paintings done on 15 x 20 illustration boards.

The digital artwork for commercial commissions is easier but he enjoys using real paint. It takes him one to two days to complete an illustration board using acrylic paint.

Ron shared his special interest for Pluto and noted that a *Pluto Not Yet Explored* stamp was affixed to the *New Horizons* spacecraft. It was launched in 2006 and the stamp has been recognized by Guinness World Records for the farthest distance traveled by a postage stamp; it has ventured 3.2 billion miles to Pluto and beyond. He shared several paintings with retro rockets inspired by his fandom of 1950's science fiction. There are astronauts sprinkled into the paintings to show the scale of the landscapes and he even has a piece with his cat in a spacesuit. He also has artwork featuring his wife in costumes that she has worn to conventions. Thanks to Ron for sharing his incredible talent with us.

We concluded the evening with some joking and reminders about upcoming events. Another fun meeting concluded. Watch your emails and we'll see you at the Anniversary party. Set phasers to PARTY!

HEIMDAL PEOPLE AND GALAXYCON

Landing Party Report – Galaxy Con in Richmond 2023 By Commander Bud Walker

Galaxy Con occurred over March 24-26, 2023, in Richmond, Virginia. This is my third time visiting this convention, having previously attended in 2020 and 2022. On this trip, I did serious cosplay for the first time, scored a major achievement in comic book collecting, and enjoyed some good Star Trek experiences.

I have spent the past year piecing together a Star Wars Imperial Officer costume, and it was on this trip that I put all the pieces together. As I walked around in my costume, I was initially surprised at how many people felt free to just come up and engage me in conversation. But after being startled the

first time, I quickly got use to it and enjoyed the interaction. More experienced cosplayers already know this, but by



wearing a costume you are putting out the welcome mat for anyone to approach you. I had my picture taken several times



(a first for me) and received lots of compliments. So, I admit I was a tiny bit deflated when I visited the 501st Legion interest table, and they pointed out all the things about my costume that were not "screen accurate." Regardless, I enjoyed the experience and will do it again.

I collect Batman and Detective comic books from the "silver age," (late 1960's through 1970's). I found several issues to add to my collection, but I was especially delighted to find a very sought after issue: Batman number 191. This issue began a story arc about the supposed death of Batman, and I had all the issues except the first one. I have always known that I could go on eBay and probably find it, but I enjoy the hunt and it is always a little less expensive at these conventions.

The most important aspect to the convention was, of course, my Star Trek experiences. One of the first things I did was get in line for a photo opportunity with Walter Koenig. These encounters are incredibly brief, but it was still a thrill for me to meet one of my early heroes growing up. The next day I was able to visit his booth and have him autograph the photo. It was clear that he is in frail health, and so it is a little

sad to know that a major part of my childhood is fading into the sunset. But I am grateful that I had a moment with him, just to say, "thank you."

I attended Jonathan Frakes' panel, and he was highly entertaining. He discussed several subjects, including his directing in the latest season of Picard. He revealed the origin of his beard by relating a story about when the cast returned for the second season of The Next Generation. He had let his beard grow to full length but fully expected Gene Roddenberry and other bosses, to tell him to shave it. Apparently, Gene liked the beard and felt that it gave Frakes a "nautical" look. So,

they marched Frakes to the makeup chair and proceeded to draw lines on his face on exactly how they wanted it trimmed and shaped. And Frakes said that is how he has kept it ever since.

I also attended a panel with Nana Visitor and Terry Farrell, as they discussed their time on Deep Space Nine. Farrell spoke of her being the last cast member chosen and how she was intimidated by the other actors and their experience. But as she became friends with the other cast members and grew more confident, her portrayal of Dax grew more nuanced and had more feeling. Visitor commented on her ongoing fear of always being fired and how she overcame that. She also stated that it was weird to kiss René Auberjonois (Odo), as it *"always involved a lot of rubber,"* which received a loud laugh from the audience.

I would be remis if I did not include my impression of the convention space and organization, which are all negative. While I had many positives experiences, the crowds were overwhelming, and the physical space of the Richmond Convention Center was simply not up to the task. My previous two Galaxy Con experiences were not nearly as crowded. It was literally impossible to get any food at the food court, and since outside food was forbidden, this became a problem. I had the good



fortune of parking at my hotel but for others, parking was a nightmare. Cars filled the streets all around the convention center, waiting to get into the parking garage, some waiting well over an hour sitting in their cars. There was not enough space in the exhibition hall and the panel rooms were scattered and far away from the main building. On Sunday, I had to

check out of my hotel in the morning and my intention was to repark my car and try to see Gates McFadden. However, when I saw the line of cars for the garage, I simply gave up and drove home.

In conclusion, I must admit my experience was mixed and gets and overall grade of C-. I am glad I was able to do the things I did, especially seeing Walter Koenig, but this will be my last Galaxy Con in Richmond.

RAPUNZEL'S TOWER By Richard Riley

Hello all! I hope that everyone is doing well! I, for one, am enjoying this nice Spring weather! I am sure in a few months





I will be complaining about the heat but for now I am loving the warmer days!



This month's project I will be discussing another piece for the Orthodontist that I do so much work for. This time it is a piece based on the Disney movie, *Tangled*, which is the story of Rapunzel and the tower in which she lives. This was one of those projects that was fairly complicated! LOTS of unusual shapes and angles and the paint job was quite tedious.

To start with the client asked for this piece to be 9 feet tall, not really scaled for anything in particular just that was what he needed for the space he had. The first thing that I had to do was gather reference pictures of the tower from the movie. After that I was able to scale out what size the various sections and pieces would be. I used my favorite material to build this, Styrofoam. I was able to get the roof shape made along with the main body of the tower by cutting and

shaping the foam by hand. Other parts I was able to use my CNC machine to cut out the parts since a lot of those shapes are either round or square, which my CNC machine cuts out very easily!

There was still quite a bit of hand shaping to do on this piece. From carving out the look of the shingles to carving out the block work that is under the stucco on the tower. One of the most tedious aspects to this job was the paint work. It required a lot of masking off too, so as not to have colors bleeding onto other parts. That was the biggest challenge to this piece; all of those colors! It definitely puts me in mind as to how a carousel is painted. The final part to this piece was the adding of the ivy. That was a bit tricky to find a faux foliage that would be the proper scale to the castle. Most of the leaves are so large that they look out of place but I was lucky to find something that works quite well!

All in all, a fun build but hopefully the next project that I have will not have such an intricate paint scheme! :)

After rummaging at length through all of my old files I found some notations on a piece of papyrus that indicated some 30 years ago I discovered the game known as paintball. I was instantly attracted to the sport because, truth be known, I have never fully grown up. Sure, I

reached 6'2" tall before graduating from high school but the kid in me has always enjoyed competition and still does today. That same kid watched Star Trek on a TV that didn't do justice to the special effects of space travel. Everything on



the screen was hidden behind a constant condition known as snow. But the memories of the show stayed with me into adulthood and when the movies began coming to the big screen I was there watching with great enthusiasm.

It was at one of the movies that a group from the USS Heimdal was recruiting for something called Starfleet and a short time later I signed my family up for membership. The owner of the field said to really enjoy the game I should buy my own equipment and make sure I bought a mask with a thermal lens because they didn't fog as badly. I went home and began researching what was the best equipment that I could afford. It arrived and the rest, as they say, is history. 5 months later I was asked if I wanted to join a tournament team and I naturally said, *"sure."*

Over time I purchased enough gear to be able to run games on my own and would have small groups come out to play. Somewhere along the line I brought the idea of doing paintball to the Heimdal and we would get a group together and play at one of the local fields. Then I had an epiphany! Present to the Heimdal the idea of pitting department against department in what I called simulated phaser practice. Or phaser sim for short. We had quite a few come out and try their hand at eliminating the other department members. As folk returned and showed an improvement in skills, I would make up nice certificates suitable for framing and present them at our regular meetings.



About five years ago I got with the department heads and asked if they would be interested in taking part in what I call the Heimdal Phaser Sim Challenge. Everyone said it sounded like fun so I bought an engraved trophy that would be awarded to whichever department proved victorious for the day. The trophy would then be put on display at the next Heimdal meeting and an article would be included in the monthly newsletter. Along with the trophy went full bragging rights until the next challenge when the trophy would be up for grabs again. At the final game of the year the department that won that day would keep the trophy forever.

During that first year the Security Department won the first contest and as the months passed Sciences and Engineering



both held the trophy at different times. For the final competition Security again won the day and the trophy has been in their possession ever since. PRIVATE JAPANESE MOON LANDER REACHES LUNAR ORBIT By Adm. Willy Smith, Chief Science Officer, Starfleet SFDPP Certified





Well, everybody and their brother has their sights set on landing on and orbiting the moon! The Hakuto-R spacecraft has made it to the moon with the help of a SpaceX Falcon 9. The <u>Hakuto-R spacecraft</u> entered lunar orbit on March 20, notching a huge milestone for the Japanese company **ispace**, which has big plans in <u>Earth</u>-moon space.

"The successful insertion of the lander into lunar orbit is an important step toward the establishment of a payload transportation service, as it demonstrates that **ispace** is capable of transporting customer payloads to orbit around the <u>moon</u>," representatives of Tokyo-based **ispace** <u>wrote in an update</u>(opens in new tab) on Tuesday (March 21). "Future **ispace** missions will involve deployment of satellites into lunar orbit," they added.



Hakuto-R launched atop a <u>SpaceX</u> Falcon 9 rocket on Dec. 11,22, kicking off a test flight that **ispace** calls Mission 1. The lander then took a long, looping and highly energy-efficient path to the moon, finally arriving there after an engine burn that started at 9:24 p.m. EDT on Monday (0124 GMT and 10:24 a.m. Japan Standard Time on Tuesday).

"After a controlled burn from the lander's main propulsion system lasting several minutes, the maneuver was successfully completed," **ispace** wrote in Tuesday's update.

Hakuto-R's work is far from done, however: The lander will attempt to touch down on the moon late next month, if all goes according to plan. **ispace** has not yet announced a target date

for that landmark try.

And it will indeed be a landmark: No privately operated spacecraft has ever landed softly on the moon. To date, the only probes to achieve the feat have been operated by the national space agencies of the U.S., the Soviet Union and China. If Hakuto-R does ace the landing, it will deploy a tiny <u>rover named Rashid</u> for the United Arab Emirates' space agency. If all goes according to plan, Mission 1 will be followed in relatively quick succession by two other robotic flights to the surface of the moon, as **ispace** works to help lay the foundation for a cislunar economy.

Mission 2 and Mission 3 are targeted to launch in 2024 and 2025, respectively. Mission 3's lander will carry payloads to the surface and also deploy two communications satellites in lunar orbit, **ispace** representatives have said.

With Hakuto-R's success, there are now two privately operated spacecraft orbiting the moon. The other is <u>CAPSTONE</u>, a tiny cubesat operated for NASA by Colorado-based company Advanced Space.

<u>CAPSTONE arrived in a near-rectilinear halo orbit</u> around the moon last November. The probe's main task is testing the stability of the lunar NRHO, the same path that will be taken by NASA's moon-orbiting Gateway space station, a key component of the agency's <u>Artemis program</u>. Things might get crowded up there in the near future.

MEDICAL MINUTE - APRIL 2023 By Commodore Tammy White, Chief Medical Officer




We have all heard that the leading cause of death in the US is heart disease. There were 695,547 deaths in 2021 due to heart disease. In comparison cancer was second with 605,213, Covid-19 was next with 416,893 deaths.

The percentage of adults who have ever been diagnosed with coronary heart disease (CAD) is 4.9%. The number of visits to physician offices with coronary atherosclerosis and other chronic ischemic heart disease as the primary diagnosis

is 13.0 million. Percent of visits to physician offices with CAD, ischemic heart disease, or history of myocardial infarction indicated on the medical record is 6.9% and deaths per 100,000 population is 209.6.

The news isn't all bad though. There are several ways to increase your chances of avoiding heart disease. By living a healthy lifestyle, you can help keep your blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar levels normal and lower your risk for heart disease and heart attack.

Choose healthy meals and snacks to help prevent heart disease and its complications. Be sure to eat plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables and fewer processed foods. Eating lots of foods high in saturated fat and trans-fat may contribute to heart disease.





You can help prevent high cholesterol by eating food high in fiber and low in saturated fats, trans fats, and cholesterol. Limiting salt in your diet can lower your blood pressure and limiting sugar in your diet can lower your blood sugar level to prevent or help control diabetes.

Drinking too much alcohol can raise you blood pressure. Men should have no more than 2 drinks per day, and women no more than 1.

People with overweight or obesity have a higher risk for heart disease. Carrying extra weight can put extra stress on the heart and blood vessels. Physical activity can help you maintain a healthy weight and lower your blood pressure, blood cholesterol, and blood sugar levels. For adults, the Surgeon General recommends 2 hours and 30 minutes of moderate-intensity exercise, like brisk walking or bicycling, every week. Children and adolescents should get 1 hour of physical



activity every day.

Cigarette smoking greatly increases your risk for heart disease. If you don't smoke, don't start. If you do smoke, quitting will lower your risk for heart disease. Your doctor can suggest ways to help you quit.

Your health care team should test your blood levels of <u>cholesterol</u> at least once every 4 to 6 years. If you have already been diagnosed with high cholesterol or have a family history of the condition, you may need to have your cholesterol checked more often. Talk with your health care team about this simple blood test. If you have high cholesterol, medicines and lifestyle changes can help

reduce your risk for heart disease.

<u>High blood pressure</u> usually has no symptoms, so have it checked on a regular basis. Your health care team should measure your blood pressure at least once every 2 years if you have never had high blood pressure or other risk factors for heart disease. If you have been diagnosed with high blood pressure, also called hypertension, your health care team will measure your blood pressure more often to make sure you have the condition under control. Talk with your health care team about how often you should check your blood pressure. You can check it at a doctor's office, at a pharmacy, or at home. If you have high blood pressure, your health care team might recommend some changes in your lifestyle, such as lowering the <u>sodium</u> in your diet; your doctor may also prescribe medicine to help lower your blood pressure. If you have diabetes, <u>monitor your blood sugar levels</u> carefully. Talk with your health care team about treatment options. Your doctor may recommend certain lifestyle changes to help keep your blood sugar under control. These actions will help <u>reduce your risk for heart disease</u>.

If you take medicine to treat high blood cholesterol, high blood pressure, or diabetes, follow your doctor's instructions carefully. Always ask questions if you don't understand something. Never stop taking your medicine without first talking to your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist.

You and your health care team can work together to prevent or treat the medical conditions that lead to heart disease. Discuss your treatment plan regularly, and bring a list of questions to your appointments. Talk with your health care team about how heart disease and mental health disorders are related.

If you've already had a <u>heart attack</u>, your health care team will work with you to prevent another one. Your treatment plan may include medicines or surgery and lifestyle changes to reduce your risk. Be sure to take your medicines as directed and follow your doctor's instructions.

I hope at least some of this information was helpful.

of the *Big City Greens* during the panel he was hosting at D23, he was on hand to hear Lawrence Fishburne announce that he was producing, along with Disney, *Moon Girl and Devil Dinosaur*. A Marvel Comic property, it would be reimagined from its comic roots to feature Lunella Lafayette, a 13-year-old black heroine with Shuri and Stark level genius. And believe it or not, there are Star Trek connections here!

I am a part of many fandoms. The Stars, Trek and Wars, Muppets, Marvel, and animation in general. And I am a fan of any children's show that does not talk down to their viewers, depicts children standing up for their beliefs, and allows children to see that they have the power and skills to craft the solution to their problems.

In 2019 when this new Marvel animated TV show was announced, I was thrilled. I followed its development. The animation looked unique and vibrant. The characters were relatable and grounded in a Lower East Side



(LES) that was recognizable. And the voice cast looked great. The show debuted in February on Disney Cable and Streaming Services. And it lived up to its hype.

Lunella, her parents, grandparents and best friend navigate life and challenges in their LES neighborhood, dealing with rolling brown outs, school, and supervillains all while having fun. The show is characterized as a S.T.E.M show. (Although, it could be seen as a S.T.E.A.M show since the artwork featured is wonderful.) But it is science, math and tech that are central to the plot and the main character's personality. It shows self-reliant kids using their brains to face life's obstacles.

While some programing geared to younger children vilifies social media, here it is portrayed as not some vile evil thing that kids get addicted to but something that those Lunella's age must learn to navigate with poise and grace while at the same time communicating feelings with emojis and encouraging us to punch that 'subscribe' button. When she is told not



to mind what the internet trolls say, it's from her savvy friend Casey who has seen it all before. No real finger-wagging in sight here which can turn off the intended viewers. In fact, in the first three episodes it seems as if no lesson is taught by her parents - it is extended family and friends that guide her when she needs it.

The plot thickens when Lunella, a genius, builds on the research of her role model, Moon Girl, and develops a portal through which emerges a T. Rex. This is an opportune time for a new street level super team to take the stage as it is learned that the power failures are caused by a supervillain. Lunella takes the name of her hero and dubs her sidekick Devil Dinosaur.

Moon Girl and Double D have been through a lot in even the first three episodes – facing the aforementioned actual troll (moral - one needs to learn how to keep trolls from feeding off of negative energy) and learning to be less competitive while making friends with a supercomputer (even though that supercomputer momentarily turned evil and hit our girl in the femur with a floor buffer). He can convey his character's entire emotional range through a series of roars so varied that you can truly see that the relationship between Lunella and Devil goes beyond owner and pet. Despite being big and red, Clifford the Big Red Dog he ain't. And Lunella's grandmother, Mimi, who runs a family-owned roller-skating rink with her husband, is voiced by the one and only Alfre Woodard or Lily Sloan or the person who was supposed to be in the Phoenix with Zephram Cochran. Through it all Moon Girl shows us that any girl - any person - can change the world. With brains, heart, friends and family any one of us can better our communities and jam out doing it. Check it out.
