people showed up at the hotel and 18 of those were Heimdal members. There was SO much hard work that went into the event BUT when we decided to HAVE the auction, we knew we had a specific 'target audience' that was not the size or scope of the people we appeal to with our Annual Charity Auction. We took a huge gamble. The UP side of this is that we aren't likely to receive any more donations of Star Trek vintage collections and we probably won't do a Collectibles Auction again.

We DID make money. We made a walloping \$1,249. Our total at the event was \$922. Afterward, I posted a list of the items that didn't sell and got offers and purchases totaling an additional \$307. Even with the hotel fee for the auction room of \$422, we still came out ahead and MADE money. So, in the end, it was a successful undertaking. A special THANK YOU to EVERYBODY that worked so hard to make it the success it was.

MAY MEETING

Region One Awards and Trivial Trek May 2023 Chapter Meeting of the USS Heimdal

The Heimdal crew gathered at the Madison Heights Public Library (part of Amherst County Public Library system) and online via Zoom on May 27, 2023, for the monthly chapter meeting.

Admiral Linda Smith called the meeting to order and reported on the results of the recent Star Trek Collectibles Auction. Admiral Smith stated that the turn-out was not as large as had been hoped for but that \$922 was collected. Sales on Facebook of items that didn't sell at the actual event have resulted in an additional \$307 profit, bringing the actual total to \$1229.00. Subtracting the hotel fee from this still delivered a profit, so she considered the event to be a success. Admiral Smith thanked the Advertising Committee and all the volunteers who showed up at the auction. She also gave a special shout-out to First Officer Willy Smith, Second Officer Carl Davis and Bonnie Davis for all their many hours of work getting the auction together.

Admiral Smith then called on First Officer Willy Smith, who had brought several left-over items from the auction. Several members at the library and on ZOOM made purchases, and a contribution of VHS tapes was left for the library. Admiral Smith then made several announcements on upcoming events:

- Game Night is June 10, rain or shine
- The next meeting of the chapter is June 17 and will be Hobby Night
- The annual charity auction will be September 16, canvassing to begin immediately
- The deadline for the next newsletter is June 1

Commander William Walker made a short presentation of recruitment materials. He showed a redesign of the trifold brochure for the chapter, as well as a mock-up of a business card that will contain a QR code that takes interested prospects to a recruitment page on the chapter's web site. Commander Walker took suggestions for improvement and revisions from all those present.

Admiral Smith indicated that she would like to redesign the layout of the chapter's newsletter and asked for ideas and suggestions to be submitted to her.

Located at the Lynchburg Grand Hotel there was a large selection of items that included cards, books, posters, and autographed pictures. Thanks to everyone who donated all of the memorabilia during the pandemic from lost loved ones collections.

As always, Carl Davis did a superb job as our auctioneer. There was a great deal of work put in by Linda and her staff to get everything tagged and set up on the previous Friday. Thanks to Bud Walker for his work to advertise the auction; the poster design is awesome! Thanks to everyone for their hard work before and during the auction.

A number of crew members were in attendance to help and observe. Outside the ballroom were Carol Arthur, Angie Arnold, Tammy White and Robin Hudson who manned the greeting table. They signed everyone up as they arrived and assigned bidding numbers to each person. Bonnie Davis and Willy Smith were our bankers, inputting information into the laptop and accepting payment. Dan and Glenda Banks worked to sell off the remainder of the Heimdal cookbooks. Joe Arnold, Julie Witcher and Glenda Banks served as our runners, delivering items to the winning bidders in the audience. Bud Walker and I tracked all the bids and gave the completed bid sheets to Angie, who then delivered them to Bonnie and Willy out front. Richard and Bud were Security. Robert and Cindy Ward came to provide backup and additional support. Thank you all for coming out to support the crew!

People walked away with some very interesting memorabilia. Personally, I got several Christmas ornaments that include the Galileo shuttlecraft, the Doctor from Voyager, and a TNG Enterprise. There were a great deal of Christmas ornaments for sale. Carl pointed out how valuable some of them are to collectors by citing the online prices. Many of them had minimum bids to support their worth.

Our tracking system went well. I think it's very valuable to have two of us tracking the bids so we can back each other up. Then getting the completed sheets to payment helps keep everything moving forward.

The idea for the auction was fantastic and I relish any chance to put on my uniform. All who showed up looked great and represented the crew well. I know it was tough on Linda and the team getting everything ready at such a rapid pace but I think you guys did a wonderful job in the time you had. The final tally was \$977 taken in at the event and \$307 for items not sold at the auction but posted later; so after the \$422 cost of the room we still came out ahead!

It would have been great to have more people attend but I believe that those who came out had a good time and got some great deals. In the end we made a profit and got to dress up. I know I love my purchases!



consideration. They are both excellent.





RILEY'S RAMBLINGS ...

BUILDING THE 'JAWS' SHARK – Bruce! By Richard Riley















Hello and I hope that everyone is enjoying the nice weather we have been having! A bit rainy but I am fine with that! I would rather ease into Summer than jump right into 90-degree weather!

For this month's newsletter I wanted to discuss my latest project, a life-size shark head from the movie JAWS! The client is opening a restaurant and the décor will be based on movies of the 70/s and 80's and he needed a JAWS bust! When he contacted me, I assumed that a company had to already be making one but after researching it I found that was not the case.

The shark from JAWS (named Bruce by the production crew after Steven Spielberg's lawyer at the time) is very unique! First the size - most replica sharks that are made are quite a bit smaller than what was shown in JAWS. Secondly was the overall look. Bruce has a very distinct look that actual sharks do not have, large jowls! The head has those jowls to hide the hinge mechanism for the mouth. So, after my research I signed up for the task of creating this replica. By looking at still images from the movie I was able to scale out the size of the beast, the mouth is over 40 inches wide, the depth and height are 48 inches.

So, first things first - I create a cardboard pattern to the scale that I need then transfer it to the foam. I cut out the profile of the head and actually have it in 2 halves. I did this to install wood for support after the build. This will be secured to a wall in the restaurant so needs ample supports inside of the head. After doing the initial profile cut, I then start the task of carving it down and getting the shape right. I used a 3D printed head of Bruce that I had a friend make that I was using as reference. I do that whenever I can to help get the shapes carved correctly.


After getting the overall shape laid in, I needed to turn my attention to the mouth and teeth! I created about 30 teeth to begin with of various sizes then made molds of them. The teeth are made from a resin so all I needed to do was put the resin in the molds and I was all set! The mouth has well over 140 teeth! When researching anything I always start down a rabbit hole. I found out when researching sharks that they shed their teeth and can have over 30,000 teeth in their life time! Truly amazing creatures!

Well, after getting the teeth made, I then had to set them in the mouth with a putty epoxy. After that came the hard part and making the finish smooth. Foam by its very nature is rough and beaded. The head needed to be smooth so I started the task of applying a material called Presto Patch, a type of joint compound. I would apply it then sand it, apply then sand. This was more like doing body work on a car than anything else! After that the final coat of epoxy was applied. That seals in all of the joint compound and makes the piece rock solid. Unlike some coatings that I use this creates a hard-shell coating that is very tough with little to no give to it. After that the paint was applied. I tried several different techniques to try and get it to look natural and ended up settling on using thinned out latex paint in spray bottles and just spraying the piece with several different shades of gray paint making the overall color look more real rather than just one solid coat of gray. The white was applied but was muted out with various shades of grays and tans.

The mouth has several colors of pink and purple for the tongue and gums and then of course some red was added to indicate a fresh kill! A gloss coat was added to the teeth and mouth and the last thing that was installed were the eyes. I used clear domes that I painted gloss black to give it the appropriate look.

All in all, an amazing project that I truly loved making! This was a true labor of love since JAWS is by far one of my favorite movies of all time!

SATURN'S RINGS ARE ERODING AND WILL ONE DAY DISAPPEAR **COMPLETELY**

The planet that I grew up studying in school and could name it because of its distinctive rings is gradually losing what are popularly believed to be permanent

features. New research shows that Saturn's eye-catching ring system is disappearing and may





soon be a thing of the past. The findings, based on data captured by NASA's Cassini mission—which orbited Saturn between 2004 and 2017—were published in three separate studies in May. Each study came to a similar conclusion: Saturn's icy rings are really young. One of the coolest looking planets in our solar system will one day look like Uranus.

In fact, the rings—made up of mostly ice and rocky dust from broken asteroids—are much younger than the planet itself and likely formed when dinosaurs still roamed the Earth. Our inescapable conclusion is that Saturn's rings must be relatively young by astronomical standards, just a few hundred



million years old. If you look at Saturn's satellite system, there are other hints that something dramatic happened there in the last few hundred million years to even cause the rings to form.

During <u>Cassini's Grand Finale</u> in 2017, when the spacecraft cruised between Saturn and its rings 22 times, researchers were able to determine the age and longevity of the rings. They observed that the rings are losing many tons of mass per second, meaning they'll only be around another *few hundred years*.

Scientists have shown that massive rings like Saturn's do not last long. You can speculate that the relatively puny rings around the other ice and gas giants in our solar system are leftover remnants of rings that were once massive like Saturn's. Studies show that in the not-so-distant future, Saturn's rings may grow to resemble the sparse <u>rings of Uranus</u> once they have eroded.

In studying the universe, we often think about origins—origins of galaxies, stars and planets. Planets are incredibly active and have diverse systems when new things happen all the time. If Saturn's rings are not as old as the planet, that means something happened in order to form their incredible structure, and that is very exciting to study.

MEDICAL MINUTE - June 2023 MEDICAL MINUTE: RUN, HIDE OR FIGHT By Commodore Tammy White, Chief Medical Officer

Due to increased mass shootings around the country and shootings in our own area I thought this month I would go over some tips on what to do if you find yourself involved. These tips came from training I did at work. It was not an active shooting but rather some videos we were required to watch. You can find videos on how to survive active shootings on Youtube.com.



The videos, which were narrated by police officers all say you basically have 3 choices and they are RUN, HIDE, or FIGHT.

The first is run. As soon as you hear shots or are aware of the danger, run to the nearest safest exit. Leave all belongings behind - do not take precious time grabbing anything. If you can get others to follow you do so, but they suggest you should not waste time if they do not want to go. You have to look out for you.

Once outside and it is safe call 9-1-1 if police are not present. Once outside stop others from entering and alert them to the danger. If police are present follow their directions exactly, including putting your hands up if asked. You do not want to become part of the problem. Remember their first priority is to stop the threat. They will not take time to help you escape or assist those injured. They must stop the assailant.

Do not leave the scene until cleared by police. They will need to speak to everyone.







If you cannot run, the next step they advise is to hide. If you're in an office building go into a room that can be locked. Lock the door and hide in a closet, under a desk or anywhere else you can be sure to turn off the lights and block the door if you can and stay away from windows and keep quiet. If you have a cell phone, be sure to silence it and call police if you can do so quietly and safely. While hiding you should think about what you can do if you face the assailant.

Which brings us to the number three, fight. If you cannot run or hide you may have to fight. Look for things you, and anyone with you, can use to fight. Things like fire extinguishers, scissors, a

chair, anything that will distract and stop the threat.

I hope none of us are ever in this type of situation but if you are, I hope this information helps.

PERFORMING PET CPR: EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW

Understanding how to perform CPR on pets is a vital skill that all pet owners can benefit from. Just like CPR can save a human's life, CPR on pets could save a life in an imminent medical emergency. Despite the importance of this vital technique, many pet owners are not confident in performing CPR on a pet.

Below, learn the basics of performing CPR for pets. With these general guidelines in mind, you'll feel better prepared to act quickly during a cardiac episode.

What Is CPR for Pets?

CPR for pets, or cardiopulmonary resuscitation, is a medical procedure to try to restore blood circulation and breathing when a dog or cat has suffered cardiac arrest. Although the success rate for CPR in pets is lower than in humans, some animals do respond to CPR. As a result, knowing this critical skill in a medical emergency involving your cat or dog is essential.





Before Beginning CPR on Pets

Before beginning pet CPR, confirm that a pet is unconscious and has arrested. Attempt to shake them or call their name to see if they respond. Check to see if your pet is breathing and check for a heartbeat. You can locate the heart by placing your hand on the left side of the chest below the elbow. Alternatively, you can try finding your pet's pulse on its inner thigh, where the leg and body meet.

If your pet does not respond, begin CPR and seek emergency medical care promptly.

How Do You Perform CPR on a Pet?

CPR consists of rescue breathing and chest compressions. After ensuring an open airway by extending the head and neck, begin chest compressions if no pulse is detectable. Position cats and small-breed dogs on their side and squeeze the chest circumferentially using one or both hands. For medium and large dogs, locate the pet's heart and place the heel of one hand on top of it. Place your free hand on top of your other hand. Depending on your dog's breed, the hand placement may vary slightly.

Your hands should be placed on the widest part of the chest for deep-chested dogs such as a Great Danes or Greyhounds. For dogs with a barrel chest, such as a Pug or a Boxer, your hand should be placed on the widest part of the breastbone and positioning them on their back is often best. Your Bettervet Veterinary doctor can provide more information about CPR specifics for your animal's breed.

Performing Chest Compressions

Performing chest compressions can quickly become tiring, so it is ideal to switch off with another person, if possible. Before beginning compressions, your pet should be positioned to lay on its side or back. Then, begin by locating the rib cage.

You'll want to press firmly into the rib cage, pushing fast at 100 to 120 compressions per minute. Keep your elbows straight while performing chest compressions. Before the next compression, watch to ensure the chest returns to the starting position. For larger animals, you may need to press with more force than with smaller animals.

Although you may feel nervous pressing firmly, a firm press is needed for successful chest compression. Do not stop chest compressions until you reach a veterinary clinic or emergency hospital.

Breathing

Extend the head and neck and pull the tongue forward to ensure an open airway. This may cause spontaneous breathing, so listen for breathing sounds and watch for the rise and fall of the chest. If breathing does not occur after 10 seconds, begin rescue breathing. Giving rescue breaths is done by gently closing your pet's mouth, covering the nose with your mouth, and forcefully blowing into their nose. Ensure that the pet's chest rises with every breath.

Give 3-5 full breaths and stop to check for breathing and a heartbeat. If possible, try to coordinate breaths with chest compressions. This allows you to see if your CPR attempt is working. If coordination is not possible, for every 30 chest compressions you perform, try giving your pet 2 rescue breaths. Rescue breaths provide oxygen directly into your pet's lungs, helping them to breathe during a cardiac event. If breathing has not started, give breaths 10 times per minute.

Frequently Asked Questions

What are the "ABCs" of pet CPR?

It's normal to feel overwhelmed and forget what you know about pet CPR during a crisis. The "ABCs" of pet CPR can help you remember what to do. This acronym stands for "airway, breathing, and circulation." These three vital components of CPR include checking the airway, performing CPR breathing, and beginning chest compressions/circulation attempts.

Where should I bring my pet after performing CPR?

CPR is intended to help restore blood flow and oxygen if your pet is not breathing or their heart has stopped. If another person is present while you perform CPR, they should begin taking measures to transport the pet to the nearest animal hospital or emergency veterinary clinic.

If you're alone while performing CPR, you may need to seek help from an emergency pet ambulance or call an animal hospital to determine the best course of action. BetterVet is available for follow-up <u>sick pet visits</u> to help you manage its ongoing care after getting treatment from an emergency veterinarian.

What position should my pet be in before I start CPR?

Chest compressions should be done with your pet lying on its side or back. For breeds of barrel-chested dogs, CPR is performed while they lay on their backs. This positioning makes it easier to perform chest compressions as part of pet CPR.

How many people are needed to perform CPR on a pet?

It's best to have two people present to perform CPR on a pet, although this is not always possible. This allows one person to perform rescue breaths while the other performs chest compressions. Performing chest compressions can quickly become tiring, so having two people provides relief when needed.



"The Big Book of Star Trek"

Review of "Star Trek First Contact: The Making of the Classic Film" by Joe Fordham – Part Two* By Zak Lyon

"By having Bob and me in this movie, it shows that we are all part of the same big book of Star Trek." Paraphrase of a quote from Ethan Phillips re: First Contact

I'm trusting my memory with this comment by Ethan Phillips. I searched everywhere and couldn't find the exact words. But the sentiment perfectly expresses how I feel about the importance of *First Contact* for the greater Star Trek universe (STU). In this part of my book review (peppered with my thoughts about the movie) I want to show how this was accomplished.

Like *Iron Man*, the first comic book film to acknowledge the existence of other powered individuals, *First Contact* was the first time all the series became connected in my mind. When the *Defiant* flew into that cool shot with the Borg Cube all I could think was "*How did they keep Sisko off the bridge of that ship? There must be a story there.*" For me this wasn't just a way to put Worf back at tactical. It was an acknowledgement of the "big book." In his book Joe Fordham shows how the architects of the film accomplished this feat.

Now we have the time to talk about time. So, let's travel back to the end of last month's article. By using time travel, the creators of *First Contact* could touch on the pre-established Star Trek history of WW3, the post-apocalyptic earth, and Vulcan first contact. Time travel also allowed the redefinition of an in-universe legend.



Much like the musical 1776 (does anyone know the Trek/1776 connection?) where we see initially flawed versions of the founding fathers rise to meet their legends, Riker's away team had to come to a friendly understanding with a foundational figure, Zephram Cochrane all while simultaneously grappling with the staggering revelation that Cochrane made this huge leap forward for humankind to make money. The crew of the "E" would see their estimation of Zephram Cochrane be broken down and then rebuilt over the course of the film. First Contact connected TNG and TOS, but this time with a more human Cochrane – "...a shambolic figure clad in flowing furs suitable for hiding an ever present cocktail flask... a deliberate departure from Star Trek legend." The book dedicates a whole section to Cochrane, Resurrection City, and the Phoenix. The details of how the Titan Missile Museum was transformed into the launch site of the first warp capable craft were fascinating,

First Contact further connects the STU by referencing lore contemporary with TGN. The Doctor is installed on the Enterprise E, The Defiant warps in from DS9, the Delta quadrant is reinforced as the home of the Borg - thus setting up the Borg/Voyager storylines and we flashback to Locutus and Dixon Hill. And retroactively, *Enterprise* is connected through the reimagining of Cochrane who is referenced in that series. The book gives a glimpse into all these choices.

Fordham relates the evolution of the script from a fantasy set deep in earth history to the final version. The original idea would not actually lead to the beginning of the STU in my opinion – just a more episodic romp with familiar characters. I also appreciated the sections on how the uniforms, the ships and the cinematography were adapted from TV to movie sensibilities. I loved the description of the "E" as "swanlike and elegant." The designs decisions made for *First Contact* carried over to the greater STU – even though some were not the best for TV.

In the section on the script, Fordham talks about how Patrick Stewart nixed several ideas. He particularly wanted to stay onboard and face the Borg. This less soft spoken, more gung-ho Picard is another gift of *First Contact* – known to fans today as "Movie Picard." This entity can be seen in new Trek in the eponymous series.

"With First Contact, all the pieces fell together. It had a great story, great characters. It was scary, sexy, funny, a little bit like a horror movie, a little bit like an action-adventure movie, and it had a wonderful pace." - Director Jonathan Frakes.

In my opinion *First Contact* was the touchstone for all future Trek and Fordham's book tells you everything you would ever want to know about how it was made. The Defiant, the EMH, Locutus, Dixon Hill, Zephram Cochrane all in the same film! What a ride! And now we have the Big Book of Star Trek. A book much bigger than ever imagined in 1996. *First Contact* started the Big Book and now it is the never-ending story.
