

He is legally blind, having lost over 90% of his eyesight to childhood cancer.

Horak has been performing on stage for over 25 years, having appeared in numerous productions in Canada, the United States, and Europe. His stage credits include an award-winning role in *Evil Dead: the Musical* and his original one-man show, *Assassinating Thomson*, in which he creates a painting live on stage.

He has also been active as a painter since 2011, exhibiting his work in various venues.

His only screen credits prior to his role in *Strange New Worlds* were the 2009 short film *Glitch* and a guest appearance in a 2010 episode of *Warehouse 13*, which starred Saul Rubinek and featured Mark A. Sheppard and Dana Jones.

In 2022, Horak also guested in two episodes of the mystery series *In the Dark*, alongside Billy MacLellan and Thamela Mpumlwana. In 2023, he co-starred in the Canadian TV movie *Family History Mysteries: Buried Past*.



## ST Episode Review: Borderland (ENT)

A Klingon Bird-of-Prey is on patrol in the eponymous Borderland, an area of space between the Klingon Empire and the Orion Syndicate. It discovers a transport shuttle with two human bio-signs, so they arrest the humans... who attack and kill the whole crew.

Back on Earth, Dr. Arik Soong sits in prison working on plans for his genetic engineering, when Archer visits and tells him about the Bird-of-Prey. Apparently, its attackers were both augments whose DNA matched that of some embryos that Soong stole from a medical facility twenty years ago. He raised the children in secret as his own, but left them alone when they were ten. Soong is freed from prison so he can help the Enterprise crew find the Augments, and fitted with a transponder to track him. Soong tells Archer to search the Borderland, so he heads there.

On the Bird-of-Prey, the Augments' leader, Raakin, scolds Malik for stealing the ship, causing a power struggle when Malik disagrees. Meanwhile, in sickbay on the *Enterprise*, Phlox and Soong discuss genetic engineering and the Eugenics Wars. Phlox says that his people use genetic engineering in medicine, but it's quite different from Soong's doing, which he disapproves of.

The Enterprise enters the Borderland, but is attacked by Orions, who kidnap nine crew members (including T'Pol) and are taken to a planet called Verex III and auctioned into slavery. Soong guides Archer to this planet, since he used to get supplies from there, while the slaves are fitted with "neurolytic restrains", which will kill them if they try to escape. On the Bird-of-Prey, Malik stages a mutiny against Raakin, believing himself to be a better leader as he thinks he's stronger and more intelligent.

The *Enterprise* arrives at Verex III and uses one of Soong's old codes to



enter the auction. They can't beam anyone back due to the restraints, and T'Pol is being sold to a Tellarite. Archer and Soong beam down and Archer finds most of the missing crew. When Ensign Pierce is put up for sale, Archer buys him and convinces the Orions to deactivate his restraint.

On the Bird-of-Prey, Persis (an Augment woman who Malik told his plans to) tells Raakin about Malik's plan to take over. She tells Raakin that Malik believes he is weak and weakening the other Augments, and that if their "father" were present, he'd choose Malik as leader. Raakin says that he will betray their "father's" principles by killing Malik. Ensign Pierce is returned to Enterprise and his (inactive) restraint is analysed by Trip. Meanwhile, on the Bird-of-Prey, Raakin tries to kill Malik, but everyone else fights back, leading to Malik killing Raakin. Malik becomes the new leader, with Persis as his next-in-command.

Enterprise discovers a code to deactivate all of the restraints, and Archer and Soong return to the auction. Archer deactivates all the restraints, leading to a riot, and the Enterprise crew is beamed back five at a time. Soong stuns Archer and escapes, then deactivates his transponder, but Archer finds him and activates his arm restraints. Soong

climbs the wall, but then Archer deactivates the restraints, causing Soong to fall and get taken back to *Enterprise*.

Soong is locked in the brig, where Archer accuses him of having planned for the whole ordeal. Soong begs Archer to leave the Augments be, since they're "the future of mankind" and are stronger, faster, and live longer than most people. Archer insists that the Augments must be stopped because they're dangerous, even when Soong points out that genetic engineering could have saved Archer's father, and leaves.

In sickbay, Trip asks T'Pol how her honeymoon was, and she reveals that she spent all of her time meditating. The *Enterprise* resumes its search for the Bird-of-Prey, only to be attacked by Orion Interceptors again, claiming that they "stole" Orion "property". A Bird-of-Prey chases off the Interceptors, then docks with the *Enterprise*, revealing it to be the Augments.

Malik tells Archer that Soong contacted them and they came to the rescue. Archer shares his plan to take the Augments back to Earth, but Malik says that Earth hates Augments and that Augments are "superior". He grabs Archer's neck, threatening to kill him if anyone intervenes. He brags about the abilities of Augments, then goes to the bridge and into a turbolift with Archer as a hostage.

At the docking port, the other Augments, led by Persis, hack into the door controls and raid the dock, stunning the guards. They go to the brig and release Soong, then Malik arrives with Archer. Soong tells the Augments he is proud of them, then tells Archer to go home and learn Klingon. The Augments leave, with the *Enterprise* too damaged to give chase, and Soong tells the Augments that they are going to retrieve thousands of their "brothers" and "sisters".

## ASTRONAUT SPOTLIGHT

STEPHEN G. BOWEN (CAPTAIN, USN, RET.)

#### **Summary:**

Stephen G. Bowen (Captain, U.S. Navy, Ret.) was the first Submarine Officer to be selected as an astronaut by NASA. Bowen is a veteran of STS-126, STS-132, and STS-133. STS-126 mission was the 27th International Space Station (ISS) assembly mission. The crew delivered equipment and supplies as well as expanded the living quarters to house six-member crews aboard ISS. STS-132 delivered an Integrated Cargo Carrier and a Russian Mini Research Module. STS-133 delivered the Permanent Multipurpose Module (PMM) and the fourth Express Logistics Carrier (ELC) to the station. He has logged more than 40 days in space including 47 hours and 18 minutes in seven spacewalks. Bowen launched to the International Space Station as Commander of NASA's SpaceX Crew-6 mission aboard a SpaceX Crew Dragon spacecraft on March 2, 2023 and successfully docked on March 3, 2023.

#### Personal Data:

Born on February 13, 1964 in Cohasset, Massachusetts. Married to the former Deborah Alden; they have three children.

#### **Education:**

Graduated from Cohasset High School, Cohasset, Massachusetts, 1982. Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering, United States Naval Academy, 1986. Master of Science in Ocean Engineering, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution Joint Program, 1993.

#### Experience:

Upon completion of the submarine training pipeline Bowen spent three years attached to USS PARCHE (SSN 683) and completed qualification in Submarines on USS POGY (SSN 647). After attending the MIT/WHOI Joint Program in Ocean Engineering he reported to USS AUGUSTA (SSN 710) for duty as the Engineering Officer. During this tour Bowen qualified for command of nuclear powered submarines. In 1997, he reported to the United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) in the Office of Plans and Policy and worked on the USSOCOM Future Concepts Working Group. For nine months in 1999, Bowen



was the Reactor and Propulsion inspector for the Navy's Submarine Board of Inspection and Survey (INSURV). In May 2000, he became the first Executive Officer of the Pre-Commissioning Unit VIRGINIA (SSN 774), the first of the new VIRGINIA Class submarines.

#### **NASA Experience:**

In July 2000, Bowen was the first Submarine Officer selected by NASA as a Mission Specialist. He reported for training at the Johnson Space Center in August 2000. Following the completion of two years of training and evaluation, he was initially assigned technical duties in the Astronaut Office Station Operations Branch. A veteran of three spaceflights, STS-126 in 2008, STS-132 in 2010, and STS-133 in 2011, Bowen has logged a total of 47 days, 10 hours, 4 minutes and 37 seconds in space, including 47 hours and 18 minutes in seven spacewalks. Bowen launched to the International Space Station as Commander of NASA's SpaceX Crew-6 mission aboard a SpaceX Crew Dragon spacecraft on March 2, 2023 and successfully docked on March 3, 2023.

#### **Spaceflight Experience:**

STS-126 (November 14 to November 30, 2008). Endeavour launched at night from

the Kennedy Space Center, Florida, and returned to land at Edwards Air Force Base, California. It was NASA's fourth shuttle flight in 2008 and the 27th International Space Station assembly mission. Highlights of the almost 16-day mission included expanding the living quarters of the space station to eventually house six-member crews by delivering a new bathroom, kitchen, two bedrooms, an exercise machine, and a water recycling system. During the mission, Bowen performed three spacewalks. STS-126 also delivered a new resident to the station, replacing Greg Chamitoff, Expedition 17-18 with Sandy Magnus, Expedition 18. STS 126 returned to Earth after completing 250 orbits in more than 6 million miles.

STS-132 (May 14 to May 26, 2010). This was the 132nd space shuttle flight, and the 32nd shuttle flight to the International Space Station. The Atlantis orbitor was launched from the Kennedy Space Center, Florida, and docked with the space station on May 16 to deliver an Integrated Cargo Carrier and a Russian-build Mini Research Module. During seven days of docked operations, three spacewalks were conducted and Bowen logged 14 hours and minutes in two spacewalks. During the first spacewalk, Garrett Reisman and Bowen installed a spare antenna and a stowage platform. On the second spacewalk, Bowen and Michael Good replaced batteries on the P6 Truss that stores solar energy. On the final spacewalk, Good and Reisman replaced the last of the Po Truss batteries and retrieved a power data grapple fixture for installation at a later date. The STS-132 mission was completed in 186 orbits, traveling 4,879,978 miles in 11 days, 18 hours, 28 minutes and 2

STS-133 (February 24 to March 9, 2011). This was the 39th and final mission for space shuttle Discovery. During the 13-day flight, the Discovery crew delivered the Permanent Multipurpose Module and the fourth Express Logistics Carrier to the station. The mission's two space walks assisted in outfitting the truss of the station and completed a variety of other tasks designed to upgrade station systems. The mission was accomplished in 202 Earth orbits, traveling 5.3 million miles in 307 hours and 3 minutes.

### STAR TREK PICARD: THE DARK VEIL

Set about one year after
Admiral Jean-Luc Picard resigned from
Starfleet — around a year past the
conclusion of The Last Best Hope and
about 13 years prior to "Nepenthe" —
the events of The Dark Veil focus on
Captain William Riker and Commander
Deanna Troi on the USS Titan.

"Nepenthe" is widely considered to be the standout highlight episode of Star Trek: Picard's uneven first season, and The Dark Veil provides new backstory that will deepen your appreciation for the episode.

Most notably, the book introduces us to the character of Thaddeus Riker, the son of Will and Deanna who had passed away by the time of "Nepenthe."

The boy, who has a gift for languages and an active imagination, is a full and vibrant character in this novel — and he's a young child who is already to developing the Ardani language and cultures that would be his legacy.

Getting to know the character in his earlier years makes his death — and the Rikers' mourning of his life — all the more poignant. The depiction of Thaddeus Troi-Riker in this novel is pretty well aligned with the notes released last week by Season 1 showrunner Michael Chabon; I wonder if Chabon releasing those notes was just a coincidence, given how well everything fits together.

Our introduction to the pre-Kestra Riker family is set in 2386, amid the backdrop of ongoing intrigue with the Romulans. By the time of this book, the supernova that would destroy the Romulan homeworld is close but has not yet happened. The Federation has abandoned its rescue efforts, Mars has been attacked, and synths have been banned by the Federation.

The story begins aas the USS Titan is on assignment to deliver several members of the mysterious Jazari species back to their homeworld, set near the Federation-Romulan border. When the Titan arrives, they discover that the Jazari are in the process of



leaving their homeworld (and local space) behind entirely. However, they are set back by a catastrophic accident which requires the help of both the Titan and a nearby Romulan warbird.

As the story unfolds, the Titan assists the Jazari in completing their mission, while aboard the Romulan warbird a power struggle ensues between the principled Romulan commander and his Tal Shiar executive officer who may have additional loyalties.

James Swallow is an accomplished Star Trek author, who has written a gripping book that fits very comfortably into the Picard aesthetic, but also feels like a comfortable bridge between The Next Generation movies and Picard. He renders Riker and Troi as the accomplished, confident officers that they are at this point in the timeline, with Riker having been in command of the Titan for a number of years at this point.

For Picard fans who might have been disappointed not to get more Starfleet based action in the series, The Dark Veil is a nice accompaniment that deepens the Picard story through

a very typical Star Trek tale. It is difficult to go into too much detail without getting into spoiler territory, but there are a lot of themes from Picard — and not just the characters — that get explored in this book. There are also two deeply surprising tie-ins to The Original Series; one is fun, and one is extremely poignant.

Fans of the previous Star Trek novel continuity will find some surprising similarities between the Titan crew in The Dark Veil and the crew of the Titan from the novel continuity; two of the primary characters from the 'old' Star Trek: Titan books have moved into the new continuity.

And though the new characters introduced to fill out the remainder of the Titan's senior staff are not quite as imaginative as in the previous novels, they are still interesting characters in their own right.

The Dark Veil also has a strong Romulan subplot that continues to explore the race's predicament, now very close to the supernova that we know will ultimately destroy their homeworld. The two main Romulan officers lean a little too hard into the archetypes of the stereotypical evil Romulan and the noble commander who stands by his principles, but both have several layers that elaborate further on things that we saw in Picard, particularly as it relates to the Romulan stance on artificial intelligence.

Overall, The Dark Veil is another great addition to the backstory for Picard. As last February's The Last Best Hope gave much more backstory to what Picard had been doing between Star Trek: Nemesis and "Remembrance," The Dark Veil gives us more backstory on the Riker family and gives us the opportunity to see them all in happier times.

I doubt we'll get anything as ambitious as the eleven books of the previous Star Trek: Titan series, but I would love to read some more Titan

stories about the Riker family before they moved to Nepenthe.

Standard Communcator: Specifications

Portable communicators were used by Starfleet landing parties and away teams; occasionally, communicators were used in situations where normal intra-ship communications were inaccessible (or inadvisable), during the 22nd and 23rd centuries.

Employing a flip-top design, a member of Starfleet spoke directly into the device to give commands and speak with other personnel. Once it was flipped open, it locked onto the originating ship's communications system. The communicator also had a gain control.

In some cases, communicators served purposes beyond basic communication. By 2152, for instance, the power signature of a Starfleet communicator could be amplified by an inverse carrier wave, making the communicator detectable by sensors. For another example, when accessing a computer, the communicator of the person at the terminal logged in the user information, thereby making it possible to trace back who accessed the computer. Communicators were also often used to allow transporter locks for beaming, thus acting as homing transponders. When used in tandem, two communicators could produce a sonic disruption by using sound beams to create a sympathetic vibration in an unstable object, such as a cliff face. Usage of a communicator, while receiving and outputting a signal, could be hidden from sensors by triaxilating the signal. Communicators could be jammed by a security screen, the like of which was employed at the Tantalus Colony. When the screen was deactivated, the communicator signal was enabled.

By the 24th century, these communication devices were integrated into the standard uniform badges and became known as combadges. Users no longer had to speak directly into the communicator, but rather could activate and deactivate them with the touch of a finger.

By the 32nd century, the technology for the communicator had been miniaturized to the point where it could be included with other functions in the tricom badge. Activation and deactivation of the communicator was by hand gestures.

Other species also possessed similar communicator devices. An Enolian communicator, for instance, could double as a remote control for handcuffs.

In the alternate reality, Starfleet communicators could also receive text messages.

So enough about the modern day cats and why we are so attached to them and on to the more scientific purpose of my article, which is about a new pale-ontological discovery about you guessed it cats, or some very distant ancestors of the big cats of today.

Saber tooth cats make up a diverse group of long-toothed predators that roamed Africa around 6-7 million years ago, around the time that hominids -- the group that includes modern humans -- began to evolve. By examining one of the largest global Pliocene collections of fossils north of Cape Town in South Africa. And researchers present two new saber tooth species and the first family tree of the region's ancient saber tooth species. Paleontologists have discovered that the distribution of saber tooth throughout ancient Africa might have been different than previously assumed, and the study provides important information about Africa's paleo environment.

The resulting population composition of Langebaanweg saber tooth (Machairodontini, Metailurini, and Feline) reflects the increasing global temperatures and environmental changes of the Pliocene Epoch. For instance, the presence of Machairodontini cats, which are larger in size and more adapted to running at high speeds, suggests that there were open grassland environments at Langebaanweg. However, the presence of the Metailurini cats suggests that there were also more covered environments, such as forests. While the fact that researchers found both Metailurine and Machairodonti species suggests that Langebaanweg contained a mixture of forest and grassland 5.2 million years ago, the high proportion of Machairodonti species compared with other fossil from Eurasia and Africa confirm that southern Africa was transitioning toward more open grasslands during this period.

"The continuous changes throughout the Mio-Pliocene, with the spread of open environments, could be an important trigger on the development of bipedal of hominids, "The saber tooth in Langebaanweg and its environmental and paleo-bio geographic implications provide background for hominid origination and evolution."

Interestingly, the researchers also note that the composition of saber tooth in Langebaanweg closely mirrors that of Yuanmou, China.

This suggests that the ancient environment of the two regions was similar or that there was a potential migration route between the Langebaanweg and Yuanmou.

More fossil evidence could help paleontologists understand exactly how these two sites are related. "The two new saber tooth are only an example of the numerous unpublished fossils from Langebaanweg housed at Iziko in the Cenozoic Collections"

So the cat is not only adaptive in our modern day lives and fits into our current environment, but also may have had an effect on how we developed and evolved as our Earth went through all of its major changes throughout evolution.

The history of how the cat came to live among us modern day humans has

history dating back to 6000 years or now is believed to be even further back than that.

Until recently, Egypt was thought to be the place wheer cats originated but archaeological discoveries have shed light on the domestication of cats. The oldest known evidence comes from Cyprus in the form of a grave where a human and a cat were buried together 9500 years ago. Cats are not native to Cyprus so the human population must have brought them with them when they migrated there. This predates Egyptian depictions of cats by 4000 years.

The modern history of cats living among us was seen in times of villages where cats were welcome to control the rodent populations in the food stores.


And among early sailors where they would have cats aboard their ships to catcg the rodents which carried diseases that could not be tended during the long voyages on the sea. Cats on ships remained a common practice even during World War II as there were many cats aboard aircraft carriers and other war ships even the Enterprise herself. There is a famous World War II cat known as Unsinkable Sam he was a crew member of several wartime ships and survived 3 different ship sinking during the war with some of his human crew mates.

Cats have been a part of sharing human lives since humans and cats have evolved and will continue to enrich our lives currently there are estimated to be between 600 million to 1 billion cats in the world. This range includes pets, strays and feral cats and they are on every continent except Antarctica.



8 ounces tomato sauce


1 package taco seasoning mix

Use 12 tortilla halves to place over the soup in dish, covering the bottom of the dish with no spaces.


Spoon meat mixture over tortillas.


Now here comes my theory; Could this refit be the very start of the Constitution class starships? or more like the start of the New Constitution Class starships?



Bajor is the M-class homeworld of the Bajorans, located near the Bajoran wormhole. Bajor is the homeworld of one of the oldest civilizations in the Alpha Quadrant, about half a million years old when the first Bajoran interstellar flight was made around the 16th century.

Following the Cardassian withdrawal from Bajor, a Provisional Government was established in attempt to reorganize and rebuild Bajor. Bajor is also further divided into different Provinces, which might carry political competences, too.

There are some nationlike factions on Bajor, prominent examples are the Paqu and the Navot. One major faction that opposed the Provisional government, and nearly succeeded in overthrowing it in 2370 was the Alliance for Global Unity.

Bajor first vied for Federation membership in 2373, however this was delayed due to Benjamin Sisko's visions of the impending Dominion invasion of the Alpha Quadrant. Later that year, Bajor signed a nonaggression pact with the Dominion prior to inception of the Dominion War following an endorsement by the Emissary of the Prophets.

Following the defeat of the Dominion in 2375, Bajor was once again in the process of gaining membership into the Federation. Bajor officially joined the Federation in September of 2376.



## Report to the Holodeck

#### MEG 2: THE TRENCH

Anyone hoping that Ben Wheatley might bring some of the exuberant personality and boundary-pushing creativity on display in films like "Kill List" and "In the Earth" to his for-hire gig directing the dismally boring "Meg 2: The Trench" should find different cinematic waters to swim in. Much as in his atrocious remake of "Rebecca" in 2020, Wheatley mostly phones it in here, and he does so with a rotary landline. At least until the final half-hour, when he's finally free to unleash some monstrous chaos, this is one of the dullest films of the year, a plodding, poorly made giant shark movie that inexplicably lets the giant shark take a backseat to an evil underwater drilling operation. This thing just has no teeth.

Never really allowed to have the winking fun he gets from his best action parts, Jason Statham looks visibly bored this time as Jonas, the deep-sea diver employee of the Zhang Institute, the facility that discovered the continued existence of a prehistoric predator known as the Megalodon in the first film. The sequel reveals that the research facility has even kept one in captivity to continue to study it. Jiuming (an inconsistent Wu Jing), the head of the institute, is even convinced that he can train the megalodon, but everything goes wrong when it escapes, and ... no, this is not just a shark-escape-attack movie, although you'll wish it was as simple as that.

Instead of focusing on the fugitive meg—who escapes hysterically easily while the crew is focused on something else—the script by Jon Hoeber, Erich Hoeber, and Dean Georgaris sends Jonas and his crew deep into the ocean to the trench that the megalodons have called home for centuries. On their way into the murky, poorly shot ocean—seriously, Wheatley's answer to recreating underwater photography is just to turn the lighting



down—they discover other megalodons, but that's nothing compared to the evil humans who also happen to be in the trench, mining it for resources. Yes, Jonas and his team stumble upon an illegal operation in the middle of the ocean, which leads to their vessels being destroyed. A sequence in which they're forced to walk the ocean floor to a facility is one of the most poorly executed in years. It almost felt real-time.

A few personality-less characters get chomped or blown up, but most of the faux tension is saved for Meiying (Sophia Cai), who survived the first film and becomes the main creature Jonas tries to keep alive. It's barely a spoiler to say that Jonas, Jiuming, Meiying, and a few others eventually make it back above the

surface, fleeing the facility now overrun with soldiers for reasons I couldn't possibly care enough to explain. They head to a resort called Fun Island, and almost 90 minutes into this mess, "The Trench" finally gets a little fun. You see, the underwater explosions destroyed the temperature shield that had kept things like a giant octopus away from tourists. Finally, Wheatley and his team get to have a little fun, but it's far too little and far too late.

Even the action-heavy final section of "The Trench" barely seems like a production trying to have a good time. How do you make a movie about jet-skiing Jason Statham throwing harpoons at giant sharks and do it with such little joy? This is a bizarrely inert film with none of Wheatley's dark humor or vicious skill with horror. It's almost like he just gave up on doing anything interesting when he found out he couldn't make it R-rated. Cliff Curtis and Page Kennedy develop a strange buddy-comedy-action vibe later on that almost works, but it feels a different movie from the rest of the action. Absolutely nothing here has stakes—so many people in Jonas' world die with barely a nod to the fact they ever existed—and anyone who has ever seen a movie knows who will make it to the final scene.

Of course, that's not always a problem. We go to giant shark movies knowing Jason Statham will save the day. So it becomes about execution instead of originality, and maybe that's why Wheatley falls so flat here. It seems like he needs to be able to play with narrative to be effective, and when he's forced into a traditional structure like he is here, he can't put his heart into it. He just checks out and goes through the motions.



Ruby's cherubic laughter serenaded the room as she giggled. "Stop that Brody," The young girl ordered without much authority.


