I really don't remember when I met Dennis but I can't remember when he hasn't 'been here.' He joined the Heimdal very early in our history so it has to be close to 40 years, which is a very long time. He was one of our first members to have a monster maroon and he went to those very early RoVaCon conventions when we went as a group ... as a chapter of Starfleet. He was even guest host to Angelique Pettyjohn one year, which was the most exciting thing for him.

Dennis let his membership lapse for several years but he came back. In those years when he wasn't a member, he remained my friend.

Dennis was quiet, but always thoughtful, intellectual and described himself as 'a man of few words.' Sometimes I'd ask him something and he would give me a one-word answer, which led to a much longer conversation, LOL. Yet he DID engage in much longer conversations when the topic was something he was really interested in. He was unique in the universe.

Dennis was the Heimdal's first Chief Engineer and was Region One's first Regional Division Chief of Engineering (RDC). He was a Heimdal engineer for almost all of his Heimdal career but recently changed to the Science Department when he developed a huge interest in Astrophysics. He wrote an occasional newsletter article and tried to come to as many meetings and events as possible. He served on the Space Camp Committee. There are so many Heimdal anecdotes involving Dennis that I don't have room for here but some are funny and will forever be a part of this chapter and my memory of the Heimdal and of him.

He introduced me and eventually the Heimdal to artist, author and good friend, Ron Miller and to talented artist and now club member, Gary Burley. He had an on-going friendship with actor and Star Trek character actor, David Frankham and made sure David was a Heimdal member and still is today.

As a person, Dennis was dedicated to his children and his grandchildren.

Family was very important to him. He use to sky dive, which he loved, but gave up the sport when he got custody of his young children, Jennifer and Mark, both of whom have grown up to be very fine adults. Jennifer and her son, Darrell are Heimdal members.

Personally, he helped me through some difficult and confusing times and I did the same for him, which solidified our relationship as not just club members but as friends. He admitted to having a mercurial temper and turned to counted cross stitch as a means of anger management and came to love it. His pieces are intricate and mind boggling and his talent was amazing.

That's kind of an overview of Dennis but it doesn't really tell you WHO he was. If you knew him personally, then you just knew ...

There's no way I can really tell you about my friendship with Dennis. He

was always 'there,' and now I can't believe he isn't. I knew when he was diagnosed with Amyloidosis that his prognosis was poor and the events of the early morning of October 31 were looming. It is incredible that he overcame crisis after crisis and defied the expectations of his survival. Because he kept doing that, my own expectations became that he would always be here. I can still hear his voice in my head and I can't believe he isn't ...

My friendship with Dennis and the part of his personal medical struggle he shared with me have reinforced in me the belief that we're putting a lot of things out front that maybe don't deserve that place in our lives. People, family and friends are the only things that matter in the end, really. Petty differences and

grievances are just that, petty. Say you're sorry if you need to. Accept apologies. Enjoy your friends because they ARE your friends and not for what they can do or be for you. Find that level of friendship that matters and hold your friends close. It is the glue that holds the best of us together.

Remembering Dennis From Willy



I joined the Heimdal in 1986 and started going to meetings in 1987. Dennis was a member and we spoke but never a long conversation. Over the years I learned he liked Grace Lee Whitney (Yoman Rand) and later, Linda put me in Engineering where Dennis was Chief.

Over the years as members of Heimdal I knew Dennis was an electrician and I worked for the power company. That mutual work only brought out several paragraphs from him but I learned he was a man of few words. I have more similar Dennis stories than sand in your shoes on a beach.

Dennis left Heimdal for a few years but returned to the club. The night he officially re-joined we all gathered 'round him for a picture. There we 15 smiling faces and 1 no smile (take a guess). Dennis's expression said, "What have I done? What have I gotten myself back into?" I enlarged and framed that picture and hung it on our bar room wall. Dennis

always said he hated that photo but I think he secretly liked it and the message it sent ... that we were all very glad to have him back ... home.

Heimdal supported the ALS Foundation one year and members agreed to do the Ice Bucket Challenge at a Heimdal Picnic and Pool Party. All our volunteers agreed to have a bucket of ice water dumped on them and I was taking videos of the event. For a moment I feared for my life when Dennis moved so fast toward me. We all got a dose of ice, including Dennis and the pictures and videos are priceless.

We played paintball and Dennis seemed to enjoy it. Once he even brought his daughter and her husband along for a day in the woods getting splattered with paint.

I liked his truck but couldn't get him to sell it to me. His grandkids, Darrell and Alexis helped me with a science project at a pool party – wrapping a watermelon with rubber bands until it exploded ... and making Heimdal a place where Dennis was happy to bring

his family. We both worked with voltage, which gave us even more in common.

Dennis spoke several times of astronomy and 2 months ago moved to the Science Department. I was pleased to have an Astrophysicist in the department and thought we had another common ground but his health changed for the worse.



I will miss knowing a man who only spoke when he had something to say. I *really* hope we meet again and he has stories to tell.

Dennis, know that you are missed by your Heimdal friends. You and I, we were friends after all.

I hope we can name an event or month to honor his time with Heimdal.



I have known Dennis for all the years I've been in the Heimdal and that goes back a long ways. He was always one of the few people who were quieter than I was and that was OK with me.

I suppose we grew closer when he started playing paintball with us and he liked the sport. He bought his own equipment and I helped him make some repairs to his marker so it would be serviceable. He made several trips to our house bringing wooden spools that had been left over on the job sites that we could use for cover on the paintball fields and we still play behind several of those today. He seemed to enjoy bringing his family to play and brought Darrel many times. Win or lose he took it all in stride.

If Dennis said he was going to be there then you could pretty much count on it and that meant a lot. The same went for helping



with the Christmas float. He would volunteer to help with construction when he was still physically able and again, if he said count him in then he'd be there to quietly lend a hand.

I'll miss him and his dependable steadfastness. A quality that is getting harder and harder to find.

Dennis set the Gold Standard in the early years of the Heimdal and R1 Engineering. I may have known him for 40 years, but if I knew I only had 40 years I would like to have known him more. Will miss him, his example, our discussions.





In Memory of Our Friend, Dennis Henderson From Beth







October 2023 Chapter Meeting of the USS Heimdal By Commander Bud Walker, Operations, Starfleet SFDPP Certified

The Heimdal crew gathered at the Madison Heights Public Library (part of Amherst County Public Library system) and online via Zoom on October 21, 2023, for the monthly chapter meeting.

Admiral Linda Smith called the meeting to order and led a short discussion on STARFLEET INTERNATIONAL's data protection policy. Admirals Linda Smith and Willy Smith are both SFDPP certified, and Admiral Willy Smith serves as the chapter's Data Protection Officer. Recently, Vice Admiral Glenda Blanks, Rear Admiral Carl Davis and Commander William Walker have all passed the certification courses. OSIRIS-REX From NASA

AT LONG LAST, NASA's curation scientists have revealed what OSIRIS-REx ferried back from an asteroid 100 million miles away. The seven-year mission scooped up a rock sample from Bennu in 2020, then returned it to Earth in September, parachuting it down



into the Utah desert. Scientist painstakingly cleaned and shipped the capsule to Johnson Space Center in Housten, Texas, making sure none of the rocks were contaminated by exposure to oxygen, moisture, or earthly bacteria and they're now analyzing the precious cargo.

Initial studies of the 4.5-billion-year-old asteroid Bennu sample collected in space and





brought to Earth by NASA show evidence of high-carbon content and water, which together could indicate the building blocks of life on Earth may be found in the rock. NASA made the news public Wednesday.

For the next two years, the mission's science team will continue characterizing the samples and conduct the analysis needed to meet the mission's science goals. NASA will preserve at least 70% of the sample at Johnson for further research by scientists worldwide, including future generations of scientists. As part of OSIRIS-REx's science program more than 200 scientists around the world will explore Bennu's properties, including researchers from many U.S. institutions, NASA partners JAXA (Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency), CSA (Canadian Space Agency), and other scientists from around the world. Additional samples will also be loaned later this fall to the Smithsonian Institution, for public display (where we may one day view the samples.)

OSIRIS-REx – the first U.S. mission to return a sample collected from an asteroid – got its own postage stamp which is on sale now for a limited time.

MEDICAL MINUTE: NOVEMBER 2023 HOLIDAY BLUES


Don't get out of control with your planning and the expectations you place on others. Be realistic about how much time

HEIMDAL'S PET FLEET

DON'T DO THIS! WAYS YOU CAN HURT YOUR CAT WITHOUT REALIZING IT From Animal Channel. Reported by Linda Smith

Cats are pretty independent animals as far as pets go. Regular visits to the vet and the right food are good starting points but not a lot of people know what not to do with cats.

We're talking about things that can leave cats emotionally scarred, hurt, or worse, so read on and learn about our feline friends.

Never push a cat off the counter

Cats are very inquisitive but do avoid pushing them off the counter.

Try to redirect their attention instead, or just remove them from the counter or whatever is causing their curiosity.

They mean no harm and will appreciate you treating them with the utmost care and respect.

Never forget to clean that water dish

Simply replacing or refilling the water in your cat's dish is not enough.

Always remember to scrub the bowl and rinse it out first to remove mold and other unhealthy substances from the side of the bowl.

Don't overfeed your cat

Overfeeding will result in weight issues such as diabetes, joint disease, and heart problems.

Avoid overfeeding your cat, and make sure they get all the proper nutrients they need.

Get them spayed or neutered

Have your cat spayed or neutered before the age of five months. Not unless you plan on having kittens.

These procedures will also help cut down on the spraying cats often do to mark their territory.

Insure your cat

There are a lot insurance companies offering insurance for your pets.

Pet insurance helps cover the cost of sickness, or even worse ones that will burn a hole in your wallet.

It is cheaper to pay for insurance as compared to the mounting medical bills if your cat gets sick.

Do not punish a cat

Allow them to have some exposure to the outside world

Your indoor cats do like watching those birds outside.

Allow your cats plenty of exposure to the outside world simply by opening the window shades so they can look outside.

Leave the window slightly open for some fresh air too.

Don't let multiple cats use the same litter box

Cats are very private animals so having multiple cats means getting them their own separate litter box each.

This lets a cat go to the bathroom in the security of his own private space.

Never back a cat into a corner

Do not back a cat into a corner, and make sure to provide them an escape route in any situation.

Cats can become aggressive and even lash out when needed.

Your cat may end up being nervous or stressed out, and that can cause changes in their behavior.

Do not declaw your cat

What you are doing is removing the upper parts of a cat's toes.

This puts your cat at a disadvantage when they have to defend themselves, so use other methods to deter scratching, like specially designed tapes and sprays.

Don't leave an indoor cat outside without supervision

Your indoor cat has to be supervised when outdoors.

Cats who are not used to being outdoors can react out of curiosity, fright, or even confusion.

You don't want your cat to run into traffic, unaware of the dangers involved.

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Don't expose them to second hand smoke

If you smoke, then avoid exposing your cat to secondhand smoke. It's dangerous to humans and to animals.

Not to mention that secondhand smoke is also linked to the development of cancer.

Never throw your cat

Some people actually think it's funny, while others are just mean to cats, but throwing a cat can seriously injury them.

Always treat animals gently and with respect.

Your cat may not get physically hurt, but you could damage her mentally.

Never leave them in the dark for extended periods of time

STARFLEET INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP RATES From Linda

Star Trek home media collectors are in for a treat, as Paramount announces three upcoming releases related to the legendary Jean-Luc Picard: Star Trek: Picard – The Final Season, Star Trek: Picard – The Complete Series, and the mammoth Star Trek: The Picard Legacy Collection.

Star Trek: Picard – The Final Season

Coming September 5, 2023, is the final season of Star Trek: Picard on DVD, Blu-ray, and limited-edition Blu-ray Steelbook. Star Trek: Picard – The Final Season includes more than two hours of special features, including behind-the-scenes featurettes with the cast and crew, a gag reel, and deleted scenes.

The special features included in this release are:

The Gang's All Here – Featurette (Exclusive)

The Making of the Last Generation – Featurette (Exclusive)

Audio Commentary on select episodes (Exclusive)

Deleted Scenes (Exclusive)

Gag Reel (Exclusive)

Villainous Vadic – Featurette Picard: The Final Season Q&A

Star Trek: Picard – The Complete Series

Also coming on September 5 is Star Trek: Picard – The Complete Series, a collection that includes all three seasons of the titular show and more than seven hours of special features.



Finally, on October 17, 2023, fans can get their hands on the Star Trek: The Picard Legacy Collection, a 54-disc set containing the entirety of Star Trek: The Next Generation, all four TNG movies, and all three seasons of Star Trek: Picard. This limited set also includes an exclusive edition of The Wisdom of Picard featuring brand new artwork and quotes, along with a one-of-a-kind deck of playing cards, a magnet sheet featuring all of Captain Picard's badges, and four custom Chateau Picard drink coasters.





There's no word yet on pricing or pre-order availability. Unfortunately, there are no details about a 4K release for any of these items.

Prodigy's Crew Reassigned ...with promotions and help from their "fan moms" By Zak Lyon

I bet you were expecting me to write about this sooner - about one of my favorite *Star Trek* series suddenly being in peril. But I promised myself I wasn't going to fly off the handle like I did in my article about *Star Trek* novels two issues ago. That wouldn't be a good look. So, I vowed not to write about the cancellation of *Star Trek: Prodigy* until I knew the end of the story. We've got it now. So, here it is along with my liberally sprinkled commentary. First, here, laid out before you are the facts:

June 23: Paramount+ announces: "Star Trek: Prodigy will not be returning for the previously announced second season. On behalf of everyone at Paramount+, Nickelodeon and CBS Studios, we want to thank Kevin and Dan Hageman... along with the fantastic cast and crew for all their hard work and dedication bringing the series to life." CBS Studios said it was committed to trying to sell seasons 1 & 2 of the show. But it wasn't the best environment for TV at the time.

June 27: The first season of *Prodigy* is removed from the streaming service. Only the first 10 episodes had been released on DVD, with no promise of the last 10 being released. Fans were devastated that they may not be able to view

this show again. Needless to say, this pokes holes in their reasoning for developing it in the first place. For the kids. Paramount+ loses credibility. Lessons cannot continue to be taught or reinforced by multiple viewings. Besides, leaving Chakotay stranded is just wrong! (To learn more about the goals of this show see any of the interviews with Kate Mulgrew. Her passion is infectious.)

Oct 11: Netflix picks up *Prodigy*! Season one will premiere in 2023. Season two in 2024. So, now the first season of *Prodigy* will live at Netflix and we will show it some love. I know some of us already ordered the DVDs (that was part of the save *Prodigy* campaign AND the discs have special features!) but we will stream it anyway.

This was "cancelled Trek" and as we know something great can come out of that. Hope. And when did I have hope? When I found that there were determined women. Mothers and daughters of all ages that were true to the cause. As it was in the beginning and ever shall be, I

love Lucy and you should to. From Lucy to Bjo to Michelle. Star Trek owes its survival to women.

Who is Michelle and how did she save *Prodigy*? Michelle Stokes, a UK Star Trek fan, created a petition to save *Prodigy* collecting 33,000 signatures and later organized a GoFundMe campaign which raised \$1517 to pay for an aerial banner. On Aug 24, it was flown over Netflix headquarters in Hollywood and then to Santa Monica to fly over the Apple, Hulu and Amazon buildings. In an interview with TrekMovie.com she said: "I've always been a big Voyager and Janeway fan, so when Prodigy came along, it gave me a chance to share my love for Trek with my daughter. Prodigy is such a beautiful show, both visually and in the purity of its storytelling. It deserves to be given the opportunity to continue to develop and grow." Michelle gets it. In response to learning that the removal was being used as a tax write off, Michelle wrote: "Money talks, but so do fans and we can't let this beautiful show go without a fight!"



In the clip of season two shown at the 57 Year Mission Con in Las Vegas when there was still no home for the show, we learned that Voyager-A was a Lamar class vessel. There is a whole article here about another amazing woman. That's for another day. So glad I get a chance to talk about it now that *Prodigy* will continue.

In response to the pickup by Netflix, Alex Kurtzman and coshowrunners Dan and Kevin Hageman tweeted: "We set out to inspire you, but you inspired us." And my favorite: "I've always held that the Star Trek fan base is among the strongest and most intelligent in the world. They have shown their collective passion, and we're happy to be

able to celebrate Prodigy once again," said Kate Mulgrew, voice of Admiral Janeway.

In the early days of the announcement of the casting *of Strange New Worlds*, I heard certain snippy voices on-line remark with rage about how they were too many women on the bridge. In the nanoseconds that I thought about this opinion, I came to the conclusion that it was wonderful to have a star ship bridge mostly populated by women. Because historically, they have been the ones with the skill to steer this enterprise - in all forms pun and otherwise.

Hopefully, a third season of *Prodigy* will be commissioned – I am confident it will if we continue to do our job. I could say that that is a long shot, but we are Trekkies and we know there is something to be said for hope. And the ingenuity of female fans.
