
XXX <u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: When Willy sends you your renewal reminder, he includes in that email your SCC number and expiration date.

of candy they gave mom for Terri was outrageous. They would put handfuls of candy in the pillowcase. While we were out, Terri had a blast passing candy out to the kids that came by. Some of the littlest ones were scared of her cast but for the most part she had fun. That candy lasted months. I don't remember any costumes we wore but it was a memorable Halloween.

<u>Tim Hazlett</u> - In 1967 when we moved to a college town in Upstate New York my mother forbid my brothers and I from Trick-Or-Treating. TOMBSTONES By Richard Riley




Hello everyone! Here we are into October. The way this year has flown by we may just skip over Thanksgiving and Christmas and be wishing each other Happy New Year! Well, before we do that and start singing Auld Lang Syne I think we should all enjoy Halloween since that is just a few weeks away!

I recently made a delivery of tombstones to my client in South Carolina, I have been making 10 to 12 tombstones for him every year for going on 4 years now. Last month's newsletter I showed how I created the Tombstone for the pirate, Blackbeard so this month I wanted to show the rest of the tombstones for this client.




Some of these are made up creations of my own design while others are based off the actual tombstones of the person

being memorialized.







The tombstones that I created based off the tombstones of actual people are the novelist Edgar Allan Poe, the author of






the Legend of Sleepy Hallow, Washington Irving and the outlaw, Jesse James. Poe's is quite interesting. When he died, he was put into a paupers grave and forgotten about for a number of years. After his popularity grew, the cemetery decided to move their "celebrity" to the front of the cemetery to get more attention. A massive tombstone was erected to mark the burial place of him, his wife and mother-in-law. Where he had been originally buried a smaller marker was placed. That marker is the one that I replicated. It seems that after all the time and expense to create the new larger monument for the celebrity occupant, visitors were more interested in seeing his actual first burial spot! This small marker is the one that for years an unknown person would lay three red roses and a bottle of cognac on for Poe's birthday.





The Washington Irving and Jesse James ones do not have such colorful stories behind them but I wanted to include Irving since he wrote such an historic piece of literature of *the Headless Horseman*. I decided on the Jesse James tombstone strictly on the Epitaph ... yes that is inscribed on his tombstone







The rest of the tombstones are based on historical figures such as the escape artist, Harry Houdini, the horror actor, Vincent Price and fictional characters such as Ebenezer Scrooge from the story *a Christmas Carol*, the large monument for the family Usher that are in the short story *The Fall of the House of Usher* by Edgar Allan Poe and the character, Annie Wilkes from the Steven King novel *Misery*.

Since Houdini's actual marker is rather small and flat without much information on it, I went with a more elaborate crypt style marker and added faux bronze chains along with a quote from Houdini on the crypt about how no chains will keep him from his freedom.

The Usher family marker I went over the top with! In the short story the family is wealthy so I gave them a very "expensive" marker and have the names of the Great Grandparents, Grandparents, Parents and finally the 2 main characters of the story, Roderick and Madeline, the final descendants of the Usher family.

The Annie Wilkes marker is for the character from the novel *Misery*. I just created it from my imagination since at the end of the novel the character dies but no headstone is shown. I used a quote from the novel to have at the bottom.

Finally for Scrooge a plaque was made of a profile view of scrooge, which was then painted to simulate bronze.

I am quite fortunate that the client gives me such creative freedom to create these pieces. He rarely suggests anything and just lets me create! The only thing he asks is that the tombstones be large because he likes them to be seen from his road easily. We had discussed it and he has so much room that I will be creating tombstones for him for at least 10 years. Fun times indeed!

This is how many people make their living almost year-round by renting their boat and taking people for a day of fishing for striped bass in the Chesapeake Bay. The same goes for other type fish in different areas. This was more than a fishing trip and I'm fortunate for the memories. Our oceans need us.





This story *includes* guys like me going to where the James River meets the Atlantic but this story *centers* on how the ocean can kill everything because of algae growing out of control. Oyster farms, crabs and all the fish die and

end up on the shore. This is where NASA steps in with the PACE satellite launched this year. This is such a cool story and who knows how it will play out and to understand this better, please watch the video linked to this story.

From the reaches of space, NASA scientists aim to expand their knowledge of how our ocean, atmosphere, and ecosystems interact with one another through the launch of the PACE satellite in February 2024. By identifying and examining harmful <u>algal blooms</u> around the world, PACE will inform communities ranging from local fishermen to large corporations on what is occurring in their backyard and beyond. From sea to space, the PACE satellite will take Earth's pulse in astounding ways for decades to come.

Bill Nye (The Science Guy) On Climate Change By Admiral Willy Smith – Chief Science Officer, SFDPP Certified

Nye explained that he used to view the 2000 presidential election between Democratic nominee Al Gore and Republican nominee George W. Bush as "the most important election of [his] lifetime" because Gore's strong climate platform would have likely spurred aggressive policy action. However, he now views 2024 as the last year where meaningful climate action is possible.

When you look at temperatures out west with over 100 degrees for most of the summer and wildfires out of control, it all comes down to science and how the heat is being trapped, warming the oceans and the air around us. The recent tropical storm was able to go further up into the US than it should have and the scary part is storms of that magnitude may become more commonplace.

My favorite "Science guy, Bill Nye" tells it like it is.

"This is it, people," Nye said. "If we don't do something about climate change this time, it ain't gonna get done."

Nye pulled a miniature copy of the Constitution out of his pocket and turned to section eight, clause eight, reading it aloud: "To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts. The word science is in the U.S. Constitution," written 246 years ago.

Nye argued that climate policy should be a defining issue in this year's election as one that affects all Americans.

"The climate is changing and we are responsible, all of us. Every time we drive a car, use gasoline, use electricity, use water — we are responsible," he said. "... We all share the air and the water, we all share the natural resources of this great country," Nye said.

While many don't (even me) think it's time for electric cars, we have to begin somewhere before we reach the point of no return. Other sources of power must be investigated.

MEDICAL MINUTE: HALLOWEEN October 2024

Medical Halloween is quickly approaching. It's time for kids in costumes, adult costume parties, trunk or treats, door-to-door trick or treaters. The store shelves are filled with bags of candy of all types just waiting to be passed out to kids in cute and scary costumes on Halloween.

Kids will be carrying many different types of buckets. When we went trick or treating as kids, my sisters and I carried pillow cases. Starting a few years ago there has been a growing trend. Some houses will set out a teal-colored pumpkin and some treaters will be carrying a blue bucket. These two colors have very significant meanings.

I'll start with the teal pumpkins. A house that has a teal pumpkin set out indicates they have alternatives to the usual candy. The purpose of this is to offer kids that may have food allergies or other conditions alternatives to candy that can potentially harm them. I found the following information on the *Living Allergic* web site. The Teal Pumpkin Project was started by Becky Basalone. She is a mother of 2 and was the director of a local Tennessee food allergy support group. She

had the bright idea of painting a pumpkin teal, the color of food allergy awareness, and handing out non-food items. What she didn't know was that her teal pumpkin would become a nationwide symbol for Halloween food allergy awareness. In fact, it's even taking off in Canada and Britain.

The folks at FARE (Food Allergy Research and Education) loved her "teal take" on Halloween and first got behind the idea for Halloween 2014, promoting the "Teal Pumpkin Project" to the media across the country. The Teal Pumpkin concept went viral on social media, reaching more than five million people on FARE's Facebook page in that first year. It's grown every year since, creating a new food allergy-friendly tradition. By 2018, several food allergy organizations were working together on the Project to heighten allergy awareness. There are several options to candy to pass out. Good Housekeeping has a list on their web site that has several options to candy. Some suggestions are Halloween bracelets, noisy putty skulls, small Halloween coloring books, Halloween squishies and several other options.



Kids with blue buckets are signifying they have Autism. "It's letting people know that, hey, I have Autism and I may not be able to say trick-or-treat or do the correct social cues of ringing the doorbell or waiting for someone to come to the door or I may get really excited that I see something cool behind you and want to come in your house," said Emily Redding, a Board-Certified Behavioral Analyst at Rose Street Spectrum.

The hope is that when candy givers see the brightly hued plastic pumpkins, they will offer up a side of patience with the treats being handed out.

"Tolerance to what you may not understand," said Redding. "You never know what people are going through or what is going on, so just be tolerant."

The Blue Bucket shouldn't be confused with the Teal Pumpkin Project. That's meant to raise awareness of food allergies through the addition of non-food trinkets and toys to your treats. Some of these kids do have allergies so it may be best to ask a parent/caregiver if they prefer candy or non-food option.

I hope everyone has a Happy and safe Halloween and I hope you will consider getting some non-food alternatives to pass out this year.

THE ZAK PERSPECTIVE By Zak Lyon A Halloween Carol

"Boy, what day is it? Then I haven't missed it!"

Pardon the oxymoron, but I have a "selectively eidetic" memory. It's amazing the random things I remember from my very young days in exacting detail. Like the first time I "saw" Dracula. (More about that later), which coincided with the first year I was really aware of Halloween. I was in a Hallmark greeting card store and as a family we bought three little decorations. Dracula, a witch and a Frankenstein monster on little black dowels. That was my first encounter with these characters. They weren't scary but had big smiles. A family friendly version. Which gave me a rather joyful attitude toward the paranormal and macabre – monster-wise, that is. And if my memory serves me right, my first encounter with these characters on screen would come the same year. And this encounter would agree with my Hallmark take on the things that go bump in the night. It was a 1978 TV special called *The Halloween That Almost Wasn't*.*

A Frankenstein's Monster that enjoys Mel Brooks and Gene Wilder's take on him. He has gone so far as to take up tap dancing. A wolfman selling out by doing razor blade commercials prefiguring Seinfeld's bit on this very thing. And Dracula, despite his complaints, is just as worried about the loss of his t-shirt sales as the potential loss of his rulership over the monster world. Before I ever saw Judd Hirsh in anything he was Dracula in the *Halloween that Almost Wasn't*. That voice. When I heard it on *Taxi*, it always reminded me of something that was special to me. But it took me years to figure it out! Before I ever heard the Klingon Ambassador "deny nothing" on the Voyage Home or heard Daddy Warbucks ask "what do Democrats eat" on Broadway, I saw John Schuck's big green guy do the ol' soft shoe. And though I didn't know him, Henry Gibson was a relatable Wolfman. You see, these were presented as the actual monsters of lore and legend, film and fright. Not preschool versions. And even though they possessed all of their "particular skills," they want to be loved and dreaded at the same time. And in equal measures. A very good introduction for a 4 going on 5-year-old.



The main cadre of monsters is rounded off with Mariette Hartley's witch, the inciting character with all the power. Halloween cannot start until she flies across the moon. She is tired of all these years being burned, banned and berated. And who could blame her. It's 1978 for goodness' sake. And she only wants acknowledgment, a simple acknowledgment with maybe a bit of inclusion thrown in for good measure.

And finally, there is a family which represents the audience point of view. The conceit is that they are following the events on a TV news broadcast. The parents are explaining the history and meaning of Halloween to their two children. It never feels like

exposition or education but an emotionally aware set of parents trying to help contextualize what may soon be lost. Halloween itself. As they continued creating Halloween costumes, they held on to hope. And you must remember that the early Disney channel where I first watched this replay, had no commercials during shows. What this does for a 4-year-old is keep him immersed in the story. When he sees a heart broken newscaster wondering about the very fate of Halloween, he wonders too. I felt all of this was happening right before my eyes. "This one thing you must remember or nothing that follows will seem wonderous" ... to quote *The Muppets Christmas Carol*. (Paraphrased from the Dickens' version.)

And deep down, even if Halloween is different for different families, something in kids always believes in magic and its importance. And they love the people, whether it's Santa or the classic witch, who bring it to them. Those kids are not just into the experience for candy and surprises but as a chance to "see" their friends. Friends that they love. The witch recognizes this love from the children as they try to coax her to play her role. And with soft unaccompanied piano notes that subconsciously I also thought were some kind of ancient Halloween carol. A song that I just didn't yet know the words to, she flies over the moon. The holiday is restored on the very day my young self-realized just how cool it was.

This special has become part of the construction of my bridge from Halloween through Thanksgiving to Christmas. Something that many children instinctively look forward to each year. It is filled with tradition, stories and the most vivid memories.

In the end, was it the witch or the children who kept Halloween alive? Clearly, the other Monsters had no influence over her. Our legends need the faith and love of children or the child-like to continue to exist. Could they fade into the past without us? All this is why when I watch the movie *Hocus Pocus* and Max describes to his sister, Danny the importance of a witch's arc over the moon, I am brought to this warm place of anticipation and nostalgia. Harvest festivals are all well and good, but they can never hold a candle to the frightful friends of Halloween – and of Halloween's past.
